## From the minister's study

I am just after reading an article I clipped from Readers' Digest, January, 1968. It's horrible, it's frightening, but it's true. The article is written in the first person. The setting is a hospital room for throat cancer patients, and the subject is smoking.

I would not presume to reproduce such an article in my own words, because I have not gone through the excruciating experience of having my larynx, pharynx, esophagus and other pieces of flesh removed as the writer did. But I do suggest that every smoker write to Readers' Digest for a reprint of the article entitled "What the Cigarette Commercials Don't Show" by Hugh J. Mooney.

Do you know that \$244 million a year is spent by cigarette producers on TV and radio advertising? There is much talk in the air about banning cigarette commercials, but it isn't as easy as it looks.

In the United States, Congress is faced with the menace to public health, but at the other end they have to consider the mighty men from Marlboro Country. What about the tax on tobacco? What about the people that would be out of work? These are all honest questions, but they are not realistic ones.

Let's think for a minute of a couple of real facts.

We can count on at least 75,000 deaths a year now in the United States alone to which cigarette smoking contributes heavily. That figure represents twice the number killed in the entire Viet Nam war. It strikes me as very strange that in sophisticated countries like Canada and the United States we cry holy horrors at the Viet Nam crisis and we keep quiet about the slaughter of thousands who give their lives for the cause of the tobacco business.

There is a hew and cry these days about the church's lack of concern for social welfare. Come on now, let's be fair. What greater social action exists than that of saving lives? The church bombarded the cigarette habit for years before science ever sounded a note on the subject. But people laughed. They still laugh, and I suppose they will die laughing.

When Peter Jackson calls, or Mr. Player, remember you may end up without a throat, with half a lung. You may end up dead.

Everyone has a king in his life. One has King Nicotine; another has King Jesus. The threat of the first is death. The message of the second is life. Choose now whom you will serve.

## Music Mania '69

# An all-color show April 25-26

STOUFFVILLE — Coming, Apr. 25 and 26 in living color — Stouffville's number one all-community show — Music Mania '69.

From all reports, it's the best yet.

The history of the program, originated by the Stouffville United Church Couples' Club, goes back to 1960.

Lorne Boadway, a charter member of the group, was one of the main promoters.

It was then called Minstrel Mania and presented in the old high school gymnasium that seated 500.

The initial proceeds were donated to the Association for Retarded Children.

The first chorus had 43 persons plus 6 dancers. There were six 'end men' three of which, Lorne Boadway, Ted Topping and Bud Sanderson, remain.

People still working in the show from the first year are: Wally Lee, Percy Schell, Marion Boadway, Jean Hammond, Bea Jennings, Ida Davis, Eleanor Mercer, Ron Mercer, Fran, Wylie, Roy Downswell, Kay Downswell, Dixie Sellers, Lloyd Jennings, Peggy Topping, Molly Mumford and Jerry Waite.

Other 'old faithfuls' include: Irvin Ledlie, Ken Gamble, Bill and Marg Murphy, Audrey and Les Clarke, Pat Byer, Jim Rehili, Ivan Harris, Helen and Don Huxtable.

Due to renovations at the school, the show was dropped in 1963. However, it made a vibrant comeback in 1964 with a brand new format. The name was changed to Music Mania '64.

Additional talent from the community was added including the one and only — Mary Harris.

Valuable, vocal and instrumental assistance was gained through such men as Frank Steele, Frank Mellon, John Foulds plus many more.

The format is set in the fall. The music is acquired by Christmas. Rehearsals begin in January. Committees are formed in February and the script committee meets every week.

Dozens of ladies prepare costumes; scenery is sketched, wherever space permits and the men are busy building props.

Music Mania '69 will include a chorus of 52; ten dancers; three in the orchestra; four end men and numerous other actors.

Proceeds will go to the Family Life Centre, a counselling service for the Stouffville-Markham area.

Other organizations aided through the years have been: Canadian Save the Children Fund; UNICEF; Sick Children's Hospital Building Fund; Stouffville Centennial Project and the Adult Retarded Centre.

The director again this year is Peggy Topping. "We feel the show is bigger and better than ever," she said.

If it's comparable to program's past, it will be excellent.
