W.M.S. Meeting

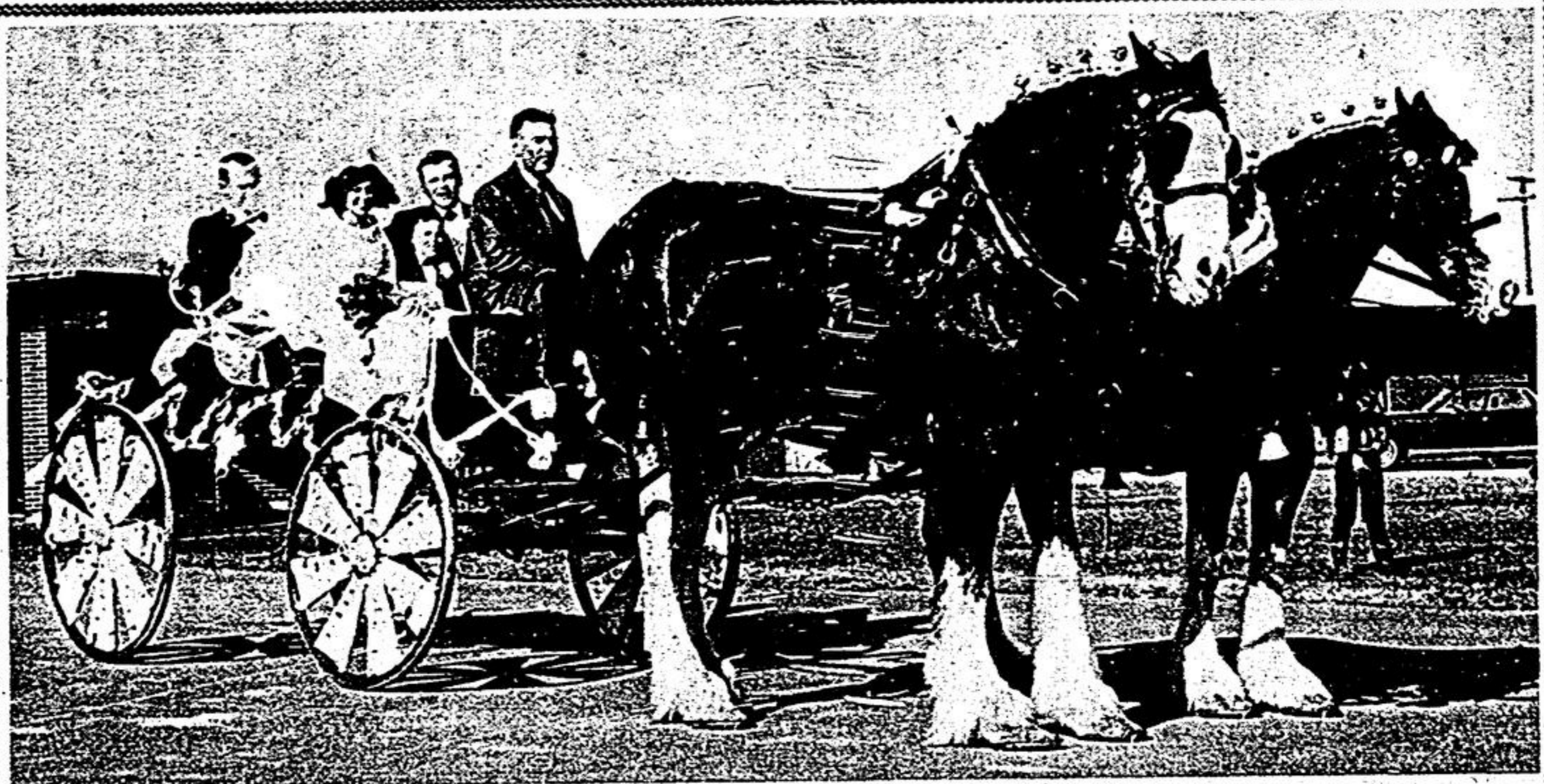

STOUFFVILLE — Reeve Ken Laushway and Tribune publisher C. H. Nolan, along with Deputy Reeve Bob Nesbitt of Uxbridge Township and editor Graham Lightfoot of the Times-Journal were guests Saturday of the Thos. Shea Real Estate Company on a visit to Columbia, Maryland, and Reston, Virginia, two planned cities similar to Century City to be built on the eastern boundary of Stouffville. Messrs. Thomas and Robert Shea represented the Shea Company. The trip was made by charter flight with some of the ground being covered by helicopter, bus and car. Columbia is on Route 129 running between Baltimore and Washington and is an entirely new concept in town planning with no similarity to present-day subdivisions as we know them. The natural beauty of the land with its lakes, hills and woods has been strictly preserved.
