

Sod-turning ceremony for Whitchurch plant

WHITCHURCH TWP.— A sod-turning ceremony will be held June 4 to mark the start on construction of a new pre-cast concrete plant at the intersection of Hwy. 48 and the Bethesda Road in Whitchurch Twp.

The firm, Jespersen-Kay Systems Ltd., with headquarters in Ontario, holds rights to a Danish industrialized modular concrete building system for North America, Mexico, the Bahamas and the Caribbean countries.

This will be the company's first Canadian

plant. Wm. B. Kajdosky, president, said that the production of elements for apartment buildings is expected to get under way at the new plant this fall. By making pre-cast concrete units in a factory and assembling them on the site, apartments can be built faster and at a lower cost.

Mr. Kajdosky said that the market value of Jespersen-Kay shares since first introduced in February, 1969 had shown a growth of more than 500 percent.

Park improvements

Fire costs climb

WHITCHURCH TWP. — Continuous fire calls into the Township of Whitchurch by area brigades is taking a heavy toll of the 1969 budget.

Councillor Norman Barnard observed that of the \$10,000 in general accounts prepared for payment, over \$6,000 was for fire service. He expressed alarm at the increase.

Police Chief Fred Mason noted that the majority were grass fires.

Councillor Barnard recommended that more charges be laid. Chief Mason explained that a number

of cases were already pending before the courts.

Mr. Barnard stated that in his opinion it was a matter of educating the people on the dangers and expense of setting fires in open-space areas. He suggested that the municipality consider such a campaign early in 1970 so that the same problem might not occur again.

Chief Mason said that in another district where he had served prior to coming to Whitchurch, it was a common practice for citizens and fire volunteers to burn off high-grass sections in a supervised program of fire control. He recalled that the system had worked out quite well.

Stop light stops chase

MARKHAM TWP. — An Uxbridge youth was stopped by a stop light at Don Mills Road and Hwy. 7, following a chase early Saturday morning at speeds approaching 100 miles per hour.
