Spot dragsters with aircraft

Two charged with dangerous driving

MARKHAM TWP. - Wednesday at Buttonville Twp. Offices police chiefs from Markham Twp. Whitchurch Twp. Uxbridge Twp. and Pickering met to discuss the "drag racing problem."

Every day complaints roll in to their departments of dragsters using highways in the various townships. The various police departments have done-their-utmost to catch the offenders but very few charges have been laid.

In an interview with Chief Harvey Cox, Markham Twp., The Tribune learned they discussed the problem fully and came up with an idea of using an aircraft to try and spot races in progress.

At 9:30 p.m. Friday evening Buttonville Police office became an operations room. Members from the various municipalities received a briefing for the night's operations. Maps showing the various trouble spots were handed out to police officers by Chief-Cox. Plans were for the aircraft to take off from Buttonville Airport containing Sgt. David Dukes, Markham Twp. police. He would be equipped with a ground to air radio and cruising in each municipality would be an officer equipped with a similar radio.

The plane flew over the various areas and about a.m. a drag race was spotted on Steele's Avenue near Hwy. 48. Chief Reg Parker, Uxbridge Twp., cruis. ing in the area, was radioed where the race was in progress and he deployed cruisers under his control to close in.

Two drivers who were racing were caught and later taken to Buttonville and charged with dangerous driving. Many people watching the race had their names taken by the police officers.

Chief Cox told The Tribune that perhaps using an aircraft will be the means to combat drag racing. "Of course it's costly, besides the aircraft which was sponsored by CHFI radio station, we had 12-14 police officers on duty and nine cruisers. Many of the officers had to work overtime and this is where it becomes costly" said the chief.

This was the first time police in the area have used aircraft and have been able to reach the scene quickly enough. Previously, drag racers had been too well organized, with spotters using two-way radios to warn of police closing in.

STOUFFVILLE · - In 1970 the village of Stouffville will pay a larger percentage of York County's expenditure than in 1969, it was revealed in the 1970 county equalized assess-

ment. For the county purposes next year the village assessment has been set at \$5,795,367, but its assessment for municipal purposes is only \$5,517,074. In 1969 Stouffville's equalized assessment was \$5,420,000 and for municipal purposes \$5,150,000.

Some other York County municipalities' equalized assessments are (with assessment for municipal purposes in brackets): Town of Markham \$14,768,-625 (\$15,499,440), Markham Township \$43,686,113 (\$35,389,241), Whitchurch \$11,688,911 (\$11,637,259).

Total assessment in the county is \$244,444,659.

Sifton building case postponed to Aug. 18

WHITCHURCH TWP. - A charge regarding unlawful building on the 3rd concession, laid against Michael Sifton by the Twp. by-law enforcement officer, Marshall Miller, has been postponed until August 18. The case had been scheduled to be heard this week.

Mr. Miller told the press that two building permits had been issued to the Siftons but neither applied to the original construction.

Mr. Sifton, wealthy publisher and horse owner, has erected a \$100,000 barn on the 3rd. The barn, complete with living quarters, has been a controversial issue with council since it was discovered in February.

At one time it appeared council might prosecute for an illegal violation of the township land-use by-law prohibiting living quarters in barns and garages. On legal advice the matter was dropped.

Since then the debate has centered on whether to prosecute immediately or to grant a building permit.
