Expanded facilities for Thos. N. Shea Ltd.

us a sign which would stress service for people. Our business is with people and we should feature the human element above the pure hardware approach to the real estate industry". The Shea firm is now going into its fifteenth year of business.

Over the past years, the Company has expanded to 75 sales people working in twelve branches, covering a wide sector in both York and Ontario Counties. The Company has also departmentalized, offering the full spectrum of real estate, insurance and mortgage services to the public.

Tom Shea founded the business in Markham some 15 years ago and has devoted much of his time to professionalizing the industry. came Vice-President in 1968. In May of this year, he was appointed President.

Both brothers have actively stressed the need for increased education requirements in the real estate industry. "Our skills are becoming obsolete overnight, unless we actively pursue more knowledge", stated Tom Shea. "Our own real estate school has accomplished a great deal" according to Bob Shea, "but we now have to consider more sophisticated retraining programmes."

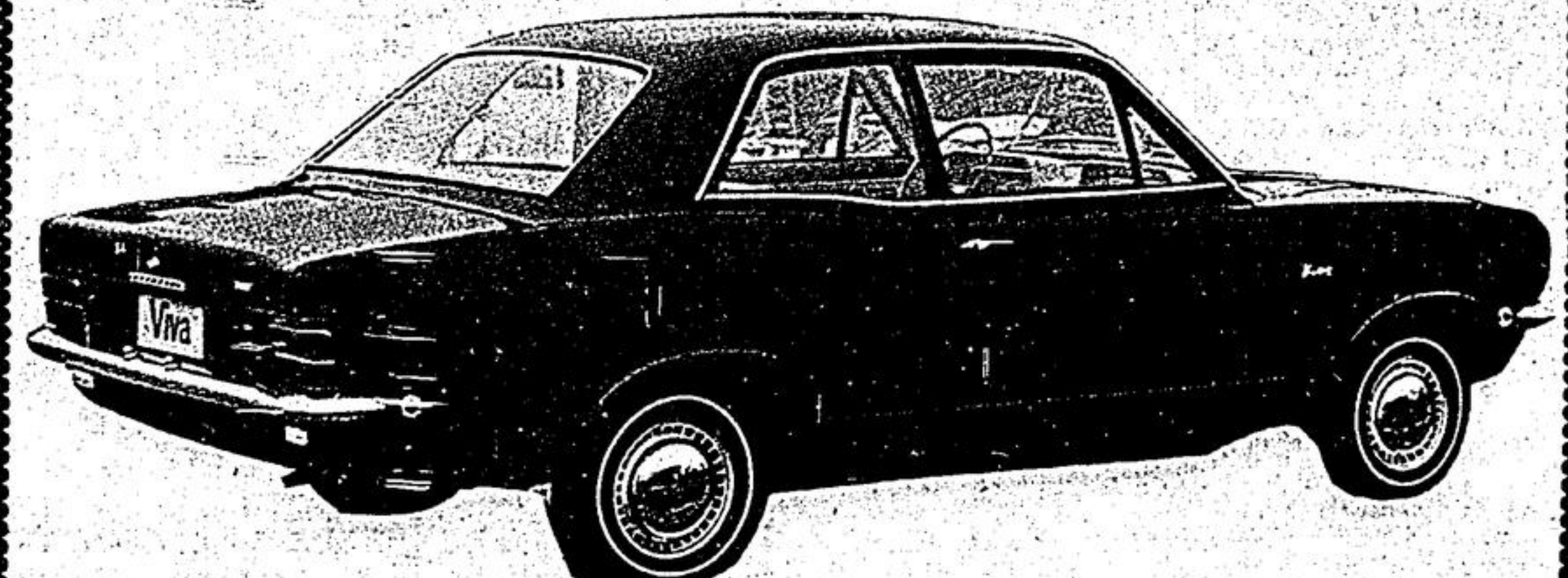
