From the minister's study

Someone said to me the other day, "I can't trust anyone but myself." It's getting pretty bad, isn't it, when you can't trust a soul? And yet in spite of ourselves we are forced to trust people, even people that we have never seen.

Take the news media for example. You picked up the news paper a few moments ago to find out what's going on in the Stouffville area. You read the news items with interest because your heart is rooted in this area. You are aware, I'm sure, that you are depending on the reporting staff of the paper to give an accurate account of the events. You wouldn't want them to say that 6 persons were killed in an auto accident when only one was slightly injured. You trust them.

In the same way you trust the elected government of Canada to do what's right by you. You cast your vote in favor of a candidate hoping, and maybe even praying that he will lower the taxes and increase the bonuses.

Even in the area of married life there must be trust. If a husband follows his wife when she said she was going to a ladies meeting, the situation is grim. There must be trust between husband and wife or life is miserable.

I hope you can see now that life is absolutely filled with trust whether we like it or not. If you accept what I have written thus far, let me ask you a very vital question. Do you trust the Bible? That's right the Bible.

Perhaps you haven't given it much thought. But you should know. You probably thought it was full of fairy tales. Now here's something. Dozens of men are living today who spend their time doing nothing else except digging up the remains of cities, records, tombs and monuments, all of which are recorded in the Old Testament part of the Bible. Do you know what they are finding? They are finding that cities like Jericho, and people like Abraham, Jacob and Joseph did in fact exist. They are finding that these people lived exactly as the Bible said they lived. Every major aspect of Bible history is now well established as fact. I thought you should know that.

But what about the central character of the Book, Jesus Christ? His existence is beyond question! He was born, lived, died, rose again and lives today. That's the message of that renowned Book, the Bible. And you can depend on it. Have you responded to the trustworthy news of the Bible the same as you respond to the news in the paper you read? Do you believe?
