Tom Davis on the Greenwood mound twirled a masterful 3-hitter. Only Eric Jones, Bruce Fockler and Gord Tarr could touch him for safeties. Each was left stranded.

Defensively, both clubs pulled off some sparkling plays: Art Puckrin looked great on a one-handed grab from the bat of Stouffville's George Neal. Brian Emery was equally sharp when Puckrin himself rifled a liner over third.

Bob Parish started on the mound for Stouffville. Don Lee took over in the 8th.

Coach Les Wilson received the trophy on behalf of his team from league president Cliff Dunkeld. "They're a great bunch of fellows," he said later, "several sat on the bench game after game but never complained. It's not hard to coach a club like that".

The majority of his players are expected back next year.

The only really firm price in the automobile business is the wholesale price the auto dealer pays to the manufacturer.
