

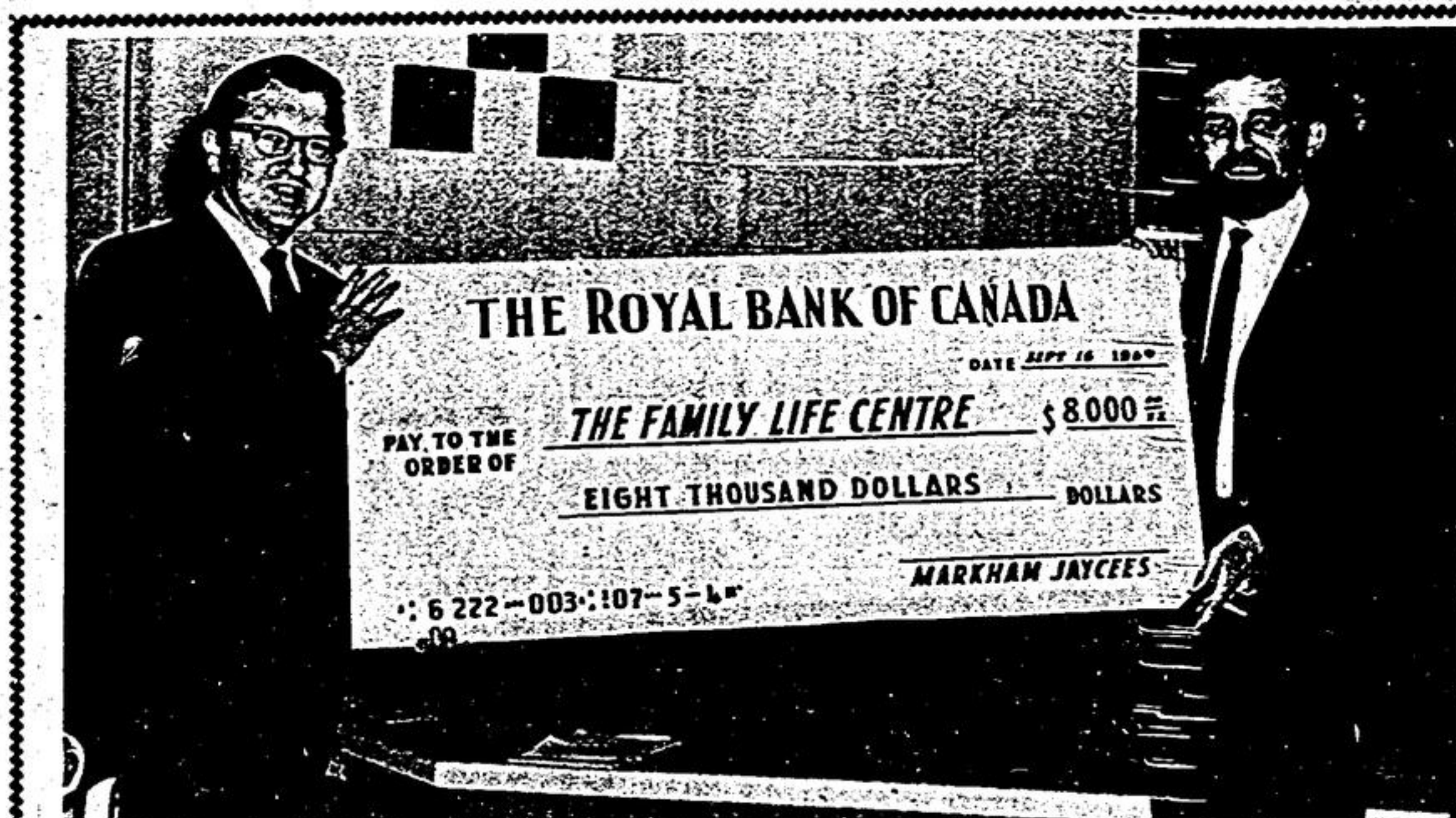
Goodwood garage break-in
