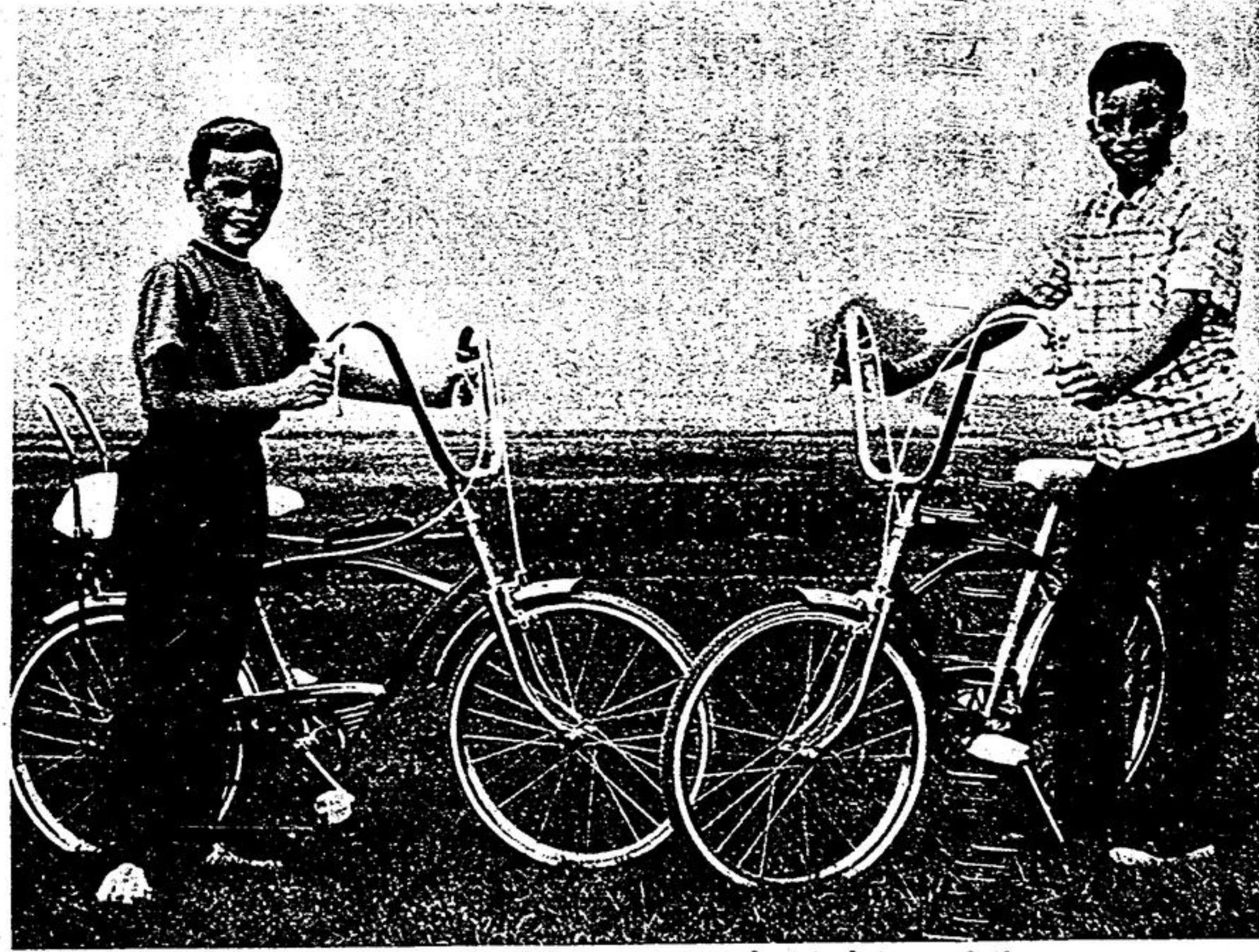
No helmet
