Livestock director, Gerald Mann reports that in the Hereford section there were over 70 entries from 11 herds. The Grand Champion bull was shown by Neil McLeod of Sunderland. The Reserve Champion went to S. M. Blair of Bolton. Mr. Blair was also awarded the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion female.

In the Shorthorn class, there were 40 head from 8 herds. Allendale Farms of Markdale had the Grand

Champion bull and the Grand Champion female. A. J. Elmirst of Indian River had the Reserve Champion bull. Bert Pepper of Newstadt, Ontario entered the Reserve Champion female.

In the Aberdeen Angus class, there were 30 head from 5 herds. Berthlene Farms, Mt. Dennis had the Grand Champion bull and Reserve Champion bull. The Grand Champion female was entered by Don Currie, Nottawa, Ont. and the Reserve Champion female by Malcolm Bailey, Uxbridge.

The judge was Murray Pimmett, Keene, Ont.

Twelve of the steers sold were 4-H entries and six from local farmers.

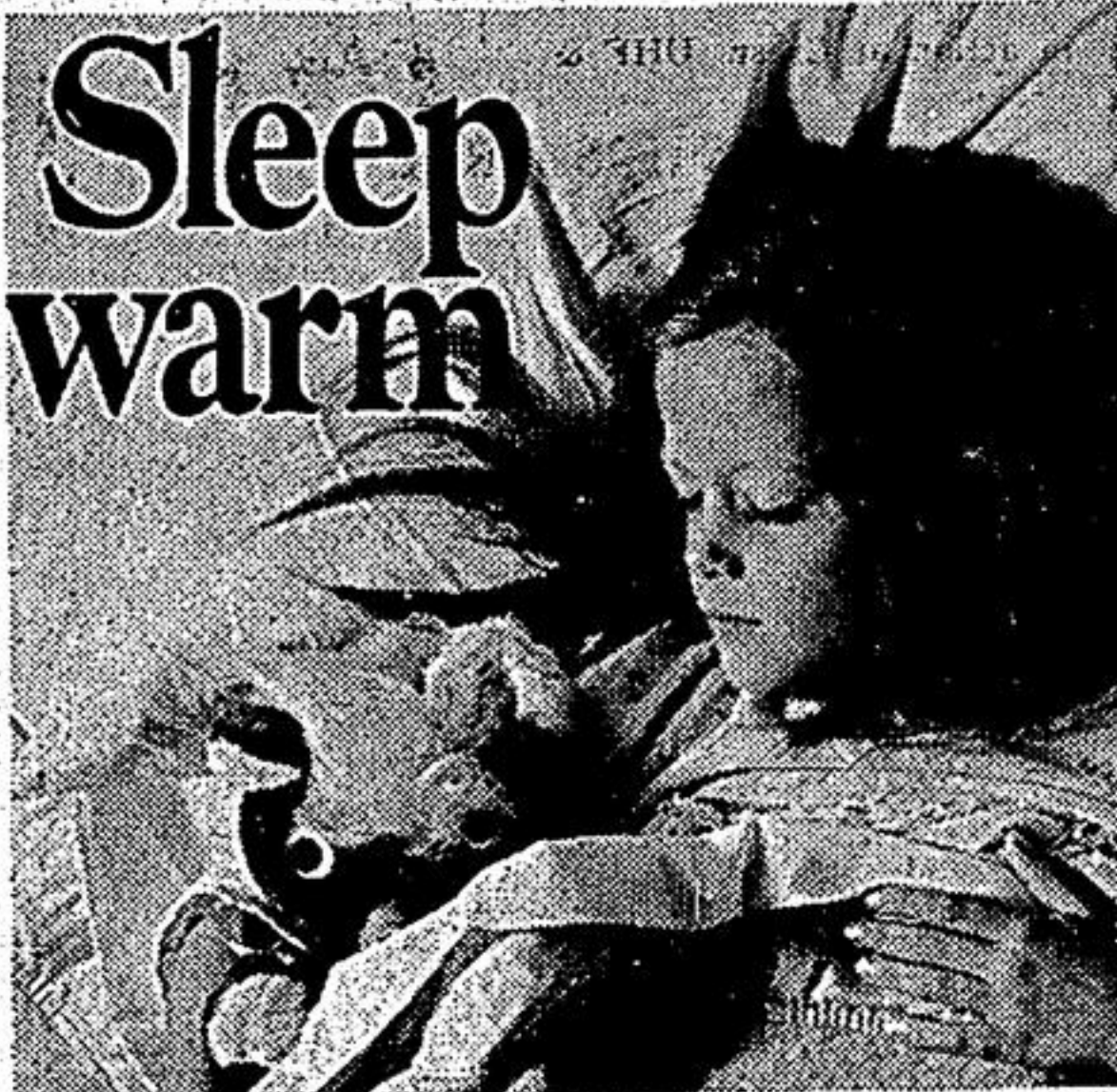
The overall average price was \$55.44 per hundred weight.

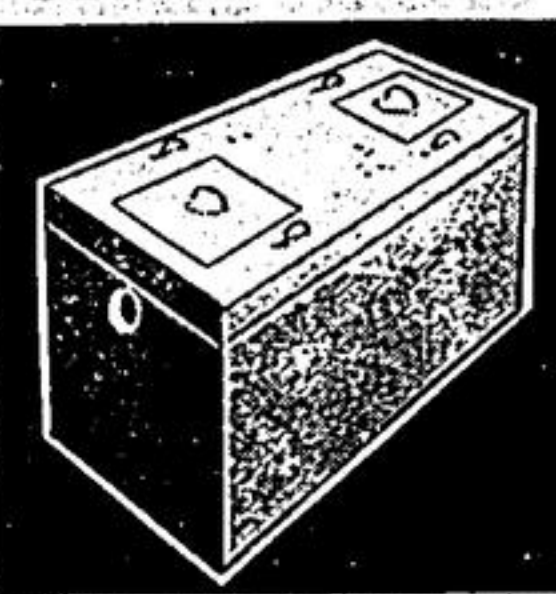

Capital grants for permanent improvements

YORK CTY. — With many farmers updating facilities, a reminder of assistance available from the Department of Agriculture, is timely.

Capital grants can be obtained for almost any permanent improvements that will permit greater output from a farm, or improve efficiency. New buildings, remodelling of old ones, silos, drainage, water supplies, removal of fence rows, all qualify.

The assistance varies with the kind of work being done. The grant ranges from one-third to one-half the cost, and the maximums are from one thousand to fifteen hundred dollars.

Grants are paid only to owners of operating

farms.

There are good reasons for having capital grants. Competition for markets in farm products gets sharper every year. York County farmers have to hold their own with producers (often with better climates) in places like California, Argentina, Australia, New Zealand, Florida, as well as other provinces.

Anything that helps and encourages the industry to keep production up-to-date is in everybody's

long-term best interests.

There is still a big slice of Ontario's economy tied up with farm business.

Elevate Silage

Finally, with lots of corn around, there may be a shortage of silo space. Stacks have never worked well, but a new idea is to elevate the silage and let it drop into a pile. The elevator stays in one position, and no attempt is made to pack. Uniform settling is the key here, to air exclusion, and it is worth a try.

Hunter Damage

Another kind of assistance that should be familiar to livestock owners is compensation for hunter damage. Where a farmer is a victim of someone with a gun who can't distinguish between a cow and a deer, a claim can be made to our office. An owner should call me, just as soon as death or injury has been discovered.
