Little Britain vs Stouffville

Teams meet in title match Sunday

Series all even

STOUFFVILLE — It's do or die for both Stouffville and Little Britain, Sunday, as the two teams battle right down to the wire for the league title.

Little Britain extended the series to a seventh game with a come-from-behind 6-3 victory on their home diamond.

The 'rubber match' goes at 2 p.m. If postponed because of rain, it's slated for the holiday Monday at the same time.

Stouffville appeared to have their third straight championship all wrapped up, leading 3-1 last Sunday, moving into the sixth. Their rivals refused to quit, hammering home five runs in the next three.

Ken Aida, Glen Jackson and Ross Madill completed the circuit for the I.G.A. squad.

Gord McMillan, Mike Herr, John Herr and Larry Lucas produced the plate power for the winners. McMillan's blast cleared Aida's outstretched glove to go the distance.

Jackson limited Little Britain to 8 hits while his opponent, Clare Osborne was clipped for 10. The winners were able to bunch their safeties together and produce the necessary runs.

The 3-3 game deadlock sets the stage for the crucial contest Sunday. With a week's rest, it's likely that both Jackson and Osborne will go at it again. Coach Roger Todd will have all hands on deck for a climactic finish. It's eight months to next season.
