School to museum

Earl Toole—Whitchurch Township Council for eleven years, Warden of York County 1942.

P. W. Pearson—taught school, then entered the lumber and coal business. He was a County Councillor and a Warden, represented North York in the Legislative Assembly.

Fred Lundy—Warden York County 1945.

Francis Starr—served in Canada in second world war, then did relief and reconstruction work in many countries with The Friend's Service Council.

By 1850 Bogartown was a larger centre than her neighbor Newmarket. Since 1803, when the land was obtained from the Crown by one Hugh Shaw the area had acquired a saw mill, a four story grist and flour mill, a busy wheelwright shop, a blacksmith shop which needed a masterworkman and three journeymen to handle the business. There were two hotels doing a

booming business before the days of Temperance Societies. There was also a greenhouse, and a thriving ice business, the ice being cut from the mill pond and drawn by sleigh in all directions.

In 1857 the Canadian Northern Railway chose to pass through Newmarket, giving that town a big boost, and giving Bogartown a set-back from which it never recovered.

It is the hope of the Museum Board that the history of all the Township can be preserved in all available detail.

The new board met Oct. 2 to hear Mr. V. N. Strymo, Museums Advisor, Historical Branch, Dept. of Public Records and Archives, speak on the functions and administration of a museum. There are grants payable by the Ontario Government which will equal amounts expropriated by the municipality, up to \$1,000.00. These grants are retroactive to allow for two years of development, and are paid after a museum has been open to the public for 360 hours.

A museum's purpose is threefold. Besides collecting and preserving items of historical interest, it provides an educational service in two ways. The public comes to the museum, or the museum, in small sections, goes to the public. For example a school could have a demonstration of spinning, carding, and weaving in its own classroom.

A good museum is also a tourist attraction — and tourism is Ontario's third largest industry. 75% of a museum's average income from admissions comes from visitors to the area.

All of us have had substantial increases in our assessment. The county assessment department has tried to establish a fair and equitable basis for the assessing of your property and have used the Ontario Provincial Manual of Assessing as a guide.

Increased assessments does not necessarily mean increased taxes. The municipalities of York County will require approximately the same amount of money to operate in 1970 as they have in 1969.

Taxes are arrived at by multiplying the assessment by the mill rate thus an increased assessment will mean a decreased mill rate in all our municipalities in York County.
