Publish school paper

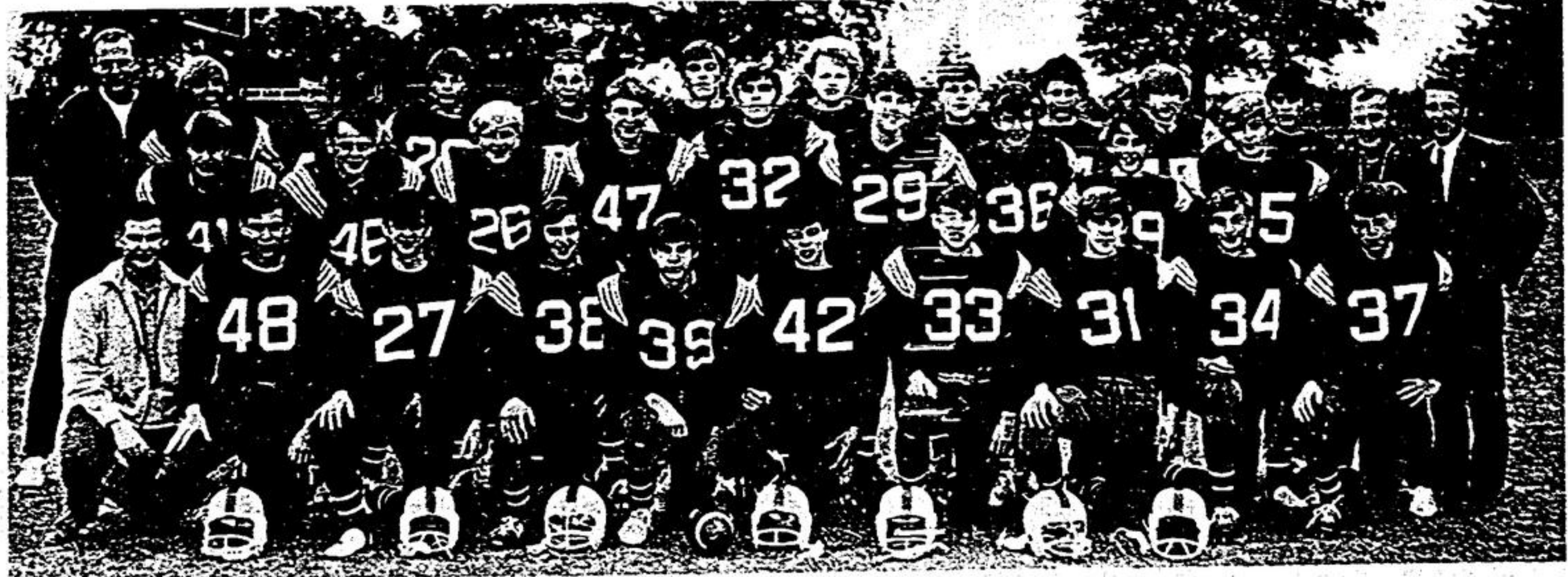
STOUFFVILLE — The Grade 6 pupils of Orchard Park Public School are publishing their own newspaper.
