Ike Hodgson Breaks overtime deadlock Clippers edge Wellington

Scores Peewee Hat-trick

STOUFFVILLE — Ted Assink was the hero for Mavflower Farms when they defeated Alndon's Kenels 3-2 in Pee Wee action, Nov. 12. The speedy forward fired all three goals including the winner with less than one minute left in the game. Mark Barry had one assist for the winners. For Alndons Jim Grove had a goal and an assist while Andy Nauta got one goal and Robert Hargrave an assist. Stouffville Co-op and Hetherington Electric played to a 3-3 tie in a wide-open game. Andy Leitch had 2 goals and Bruce Thornhill one for the Co-op. Corrie Almack earned 2 assists. For Hetherington it was Danny Brazier, Kent Wideman and Jo Thistel. Gary Mann and Jo Thistel each had an assist. D & A Construction came up with a big second period to skate away with a 3-1 decision over Stouffville Police. David Lang put the Police into a 1-0 lead in the first period. Bill Meakes tied it up from Ricky Barkey early in the second period and then Blair Emmerson scored twice to win the game. Ted Wood picked up an assist on the third goal. Master/Feeds overcame Civitan 7-2 in a loosely played game but did feature some good passing. Scott Connor led the Feed men with 3 goals and one assist while Wayne Bowes had 3 goals. Ron Schell earned one goal and 3 assists. Kevin Leonard also had an assist. For Civitan Jack Watson scored both goals with Glen Gibson and Terry Williams each picking up an assist.

STOUFFVILLE—Few of Stouffville's spectators were in their seats when Harold (Ike) Hodgson scored in overtime to break a 5-5 deadlock with Wellington.

Five minutes later, the Clippers left the ice with a 7-5 win to even up their win-loss column at two and two.

It was one of the most exciting contests to grace the Stouffville arena in a long time. Especially after forty frustrating minutes of play in which the Intermediate "B" preferred leather and wood to mesh and trailed 5-3 as a result. The gap was narrowed with less than eight minutes remaining in regulation time when Ken (Red) Crawford took a Hodgson pass and found the mark. A minute later, Al Patterson was set up by Carl Keffer to force the game into overtime.

Hodgson's climatic goal at 4:16 of the additional period eased the tension and it was almost dissolved when Bill White and Bob Marshall combined to add the insurance goal with less than two minutes left on the clock.

Dennis Forsyth who replaced Glen Jackson in the locals' cage in the final frame, was more than equal to the occasion as he shut out the visitors. He was particularly alert in stopping the drives of Wellington ace, Bob Lavender, who has counted nine goals in the last two outings.

Rearguards Don McIntosh and Dan Pettit provided excellent protection in the latter half of the affair. Bob Smith, who had the misfortune of hitting the post in the overtime period, was also up for this game.

Hodgson's big goal, which earned him a hat-trick, was also supplemented with an assist to make him the hero among the partisan fans. The other Stouffville marksman was Bob Marshall.

The losers shared the scoring as Fred Knight, Rick Rosebush, Roger Bryant, Ben Bunley and Bob Lavender each chalked up single tallies.

In a recent game the Stouffville club lost 10-7 to Whitby, after building up a 7-5 lead which diminished in the last ten minutes of play.

Bantams drop opener

STOUFFVILLE—Stouffville's Houston Pharmacy Bantam All-Stars opened the season on the wrong foot as they dropped a 5-2 decision to the big, aggressive crew of West Rouge. The visitors were helped to the win as a result of Stouffville's often sloppy and uninspired play.

One bright spot, however, came in the latter half of the middle frame when John Meakes gave a temporary spark by beating Mike Ryckman in the West Rouge net. Don Reesor and Kim Steckley assisted. Less than 4 minutes later, Mike Wightman put victory in sight as he converted a Wayne Norton rebound into a score making it 3-2. Early in the period, a blistering screen shot caused a superficial mask cut to net minder Scott Ballagh who made way for Mike Ryckman.

West Rouge had the knack of despoiling their opposition. In each of the three periods they scored no later than one minute and five seconds after the initial faceoff.

It only took thirty-five seconds in the last twenty minutes of play. Stouffville never recovered from Brian Gunn's marker which was set up by Peter Larsen. At 16:43 it was all over as Larsen combined with Randy Dear to extend the gap 5-2. Larsen also scored earlier as did Mike Stockfish and Steve Molter for the winners.

Cousins, Wayne and Donnie Norton, once again turned in determined efforts for the Houston squad. If the rest of the team can get up for Stouffville's next home game with Uxbridge on November 20, at 7:30 the outcome should be different.

WHITEBY — In the second Saturday of qualifying curling in the 4th Annual Ontario Dunlop Invitational Curling Bonspiel at the Whitby Curling Club, one Unionville rink qualified for the Nov. 29 finals and another was eliminated. Ray Grant won his first game 5-4 over Tom Howat of Tam-Heather in Agincourt, but lost the all-important second match 10-9 to Ian Auld of Toronto Royal Canadians. He will take his curlers back to Whitby for the 3rd event finals on Saturday, Nov. 29. Curling for Harris were Murray Roberts, vice, Grant Wallace, second and George Stark, lead.
