the authority of Queen's Park.

Frank Hendy, seeking re-election to council, said the past two years had been successful and much accomplished. He felt that Revenue Properties' proposal had been dealt with in an intelligent manner. "Century City," he added, "can be an asset to the township if properly planned." He argued that the hiring of a professional planner should be the responsibility of the Revenue firm and not the council. He noted that his main concern was over the possibility of increased taxes. "The township has much to pay and little to say," he concluded.

Also seeking re-election is councillor Clark Muirhead. He said he was neither for nor against Century City but charged that the press had painted a distorted picture concerning negotiations between the township and Revenue Properties. He said council had acted on whatever requests had been made of them, including re-zoning of sufficient property to accommodate C.C.M. He noted that other than artistic sketches, no other proposals had been received. He expressed concern over "urban sprawl" and said he feared it could not

be contained within the borders of Metro. He suggested that the decision on Century City should rest with the ratepayers.

Ronald Atkin, a founding member of the Ratepayers' Association, said he could appreciate the benefits of a planned community like Century City but its development should be controlled by a competent council and an equally competent staff. He urged stricter controls over gravel operations in the township.

Two other nominees, Jim Bailey and George Harvie said they needed more time to consider the issues before making formal announcements.
