**STOUFFVILLE** — It was a costly game for the 'Clippers' as they downed Picton 'Merchants' 7-4 to avenge Sunday's 8-4 defeat by the same club. Four of Stouffville's players left the ice for medical aid and only one returned.

Period one was the big one as the winners struck within the first half minute and then fired five more before the buzzer sounded.

Harold (Ike) Hodgson suffered a ten-stitch cut near the eye before Ray Winterstein incurred a gash on the face. A foot injury sidelined Bill White and Ken Aida lost a few teeth when hit by the puck. To add insult to injury, Picton were only assessed four penalties to Stouffville's eight.

Art Renick was back in uniform and back in stride as he potted a pair of goals. Ray Winterstein and Al Patterson were not to be outdone as they matched his performance. The other counter came off the stick of Bill White.

Last year's steady defensive star, Bob Tripp will not be dressed in red and black as the Whitby club has refused to waive their rights to him.

Stouffville's half dozen first period goals did little to dampen the visitors' spirits as they fought back to score three unanswered tallies in the second stanza to make it 6-3. Patterson was the lone marksman in the last frame. Bill White scored the 'Clippers' other goal.
