Favors 19 as voting age

STOUFFVILLE- "I personally favor have the voting age set at 19, rather than the suggested 18," said William Hodgson, provincial Conservative member for York North, when asked to comment on whether the voting age should

be lowered. Mr. Hodgson explained his reason for 19-year voting level by saying, that at the clder level a person is either completing formal education and entering the work force, or is continuing higher education.

At 18, he said, a person will just have completed the introduction to secondary schooling and will not

have had as much opportunity to assess the role of those contributing to the economy and the welfare

of the community.
