Lake Simcoe ice fishing not banned


YORK CTY. - The Maple District Office and other offices of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests have received many enquiries from the public regarding the status of the fishing on Lake Simcoe this win-

The Department feels it should clarify its position and also attempt to quash the erroneous reports that are currently being circulated to the effect that the Lake will be closed to ice fishing. The concern of the public and the rumors no doubt started because of the publicity being given to pollution and in particular the use of various pesticides.

Fish from the Simcoe and other lakes have been sampled and will continue to be tested for any ill effects resulting from pesticides being washed into the water. To date no fish from Lake Simcoe have been found to be unfit for human consumption.

If at any future date the level of contamination in fish is found to be at a dangerous level, the public will be informed accordingly.

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
