## An M.P.'s frustration

**YORK NORTH** — Being a Member of Parliament is a full-time job, government is more complex and sessions are longer than ever, says York North M.P., Barney Danson, but the facilities are those designed for government as it was 25 years ago. Some of the

things, he points out, are so simple, that they seem ridiculous and wouldn't be tolerated in any business operation or the civil service.

A sample of Mr. Danson's frustrations is pointed up in the following: If my secretary is out and you try to get me, there is no way to leave a message. When I'm in the office phoning — or if my secretary is on the telephone — we don't have another line to take incoming calls. We share a small office with our secretaries, which means that private interviews with constituents are virtually impossible without her leaving the room, wasting her time and falling behind in her work.

"Effective government will depend upon effective M.P.'s," he says. "This effectiveness depends on at least reasonable facilities. With a work week of 70 to 90 hours, an M.P. still can't accomplish all he wishes. With adequate facilities, we could increase our effectiveness considerably."
