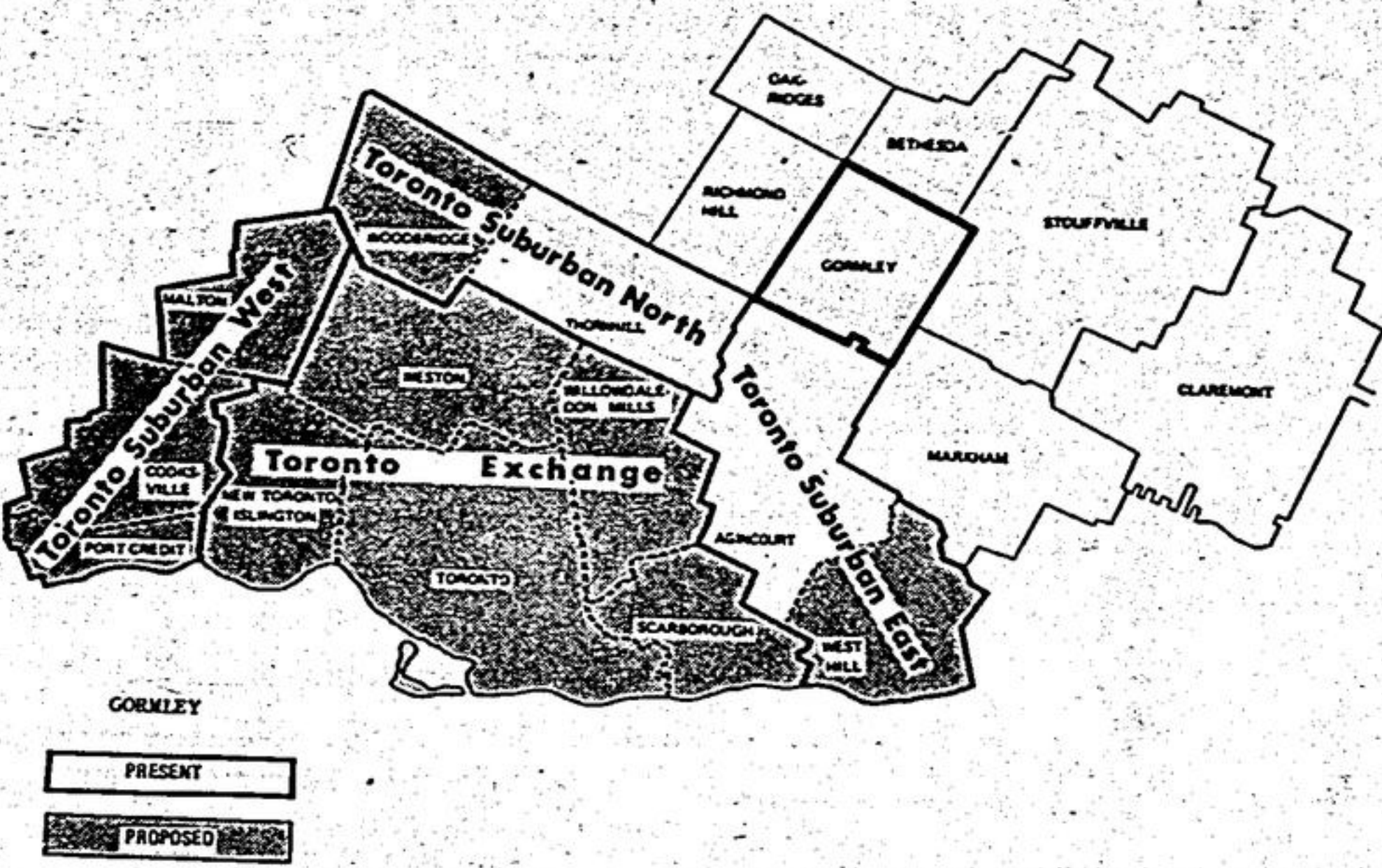


Bell plans to enlarge Gormley exchange

GORMLEY — Bell Canada is studying alternatives to a proposal which would have enlarged the Gormley (887) exchange local calling area next year.

The Gormley proposal was part of overall plans for expanded local calling in the Greater Toronto area which Bell submitted to the Canadian Transport Commission for approval in conjunction with its rate application. In handing down its judgment on Bell's application on September 30, the C.T.C. disallowed implementation of the Extended Area Service plan.

If approved by the Commission, the Extended Area Service proposal would have increased the scope of local calling so that all telephone users in Metropolitan Toronto and many nearby communities would be able to call each other without long distance charges. For Gormley customers it meant extended local calling between exchanges in Woodbridge, Malton, Cooksville, Port Credit, New Toronto-Islington, Toronto, Scarborough, West Hill, Weston and

Willowdale-Don Mills. Bell Canada's latest move to study alternatives to its original proposal was outlined in a letter sent this week to Markham Township Reeve, Stewart Rumble and Council, by the Company's local Man-

ager, G. Wansbrough. "We are now studying several alternatives to see if we can arrive at a plan that will ultimately provide customers with the service they obviously want, and at the same time be acceptable to the

Commission" Mr. Wansbrough stated. The Bell Canada studies are expected to take several months to complete before the Company re-submits its new proposal to the Canadian Transport

Commission. In his letter to Reeve Rumble, Mr. Wansbrough said he would be pleased to hear any expression Council may wish to make with regard to local Gormley (887) calling arrangements.

Teacher salaries Offer not accepted

YORK CTY. — County secondary school teachers and York County Board of Education negotiators exchanged salary offers at a meeting, Dec. 10.

The Board offer was not acceptable to the teachers. Said John Munro-Cape: "The Board offer is in dollars and at this time the teachers are more interested in a long range formula which will spell out salary adjustments as percentage increases." "The starting salaries are too low", he continued, "when compared to the progress made by other groups in the Public Service."

Art Starr, Chairman of the Board negotiation team, said, "I feel that the Board offer is in line with salary increases being granted in business and industry."

The York County Board negotiators were Trustee Merna Colbourne of the Town of Markham; Trustee Les Burrows of Sutton and Georgina; Trustee William Bales of East Gwillimbury; Trustee Ross S. Joliffe, Vaughan Township and Trustee Art Starr, Stouffville and Whitchurch.

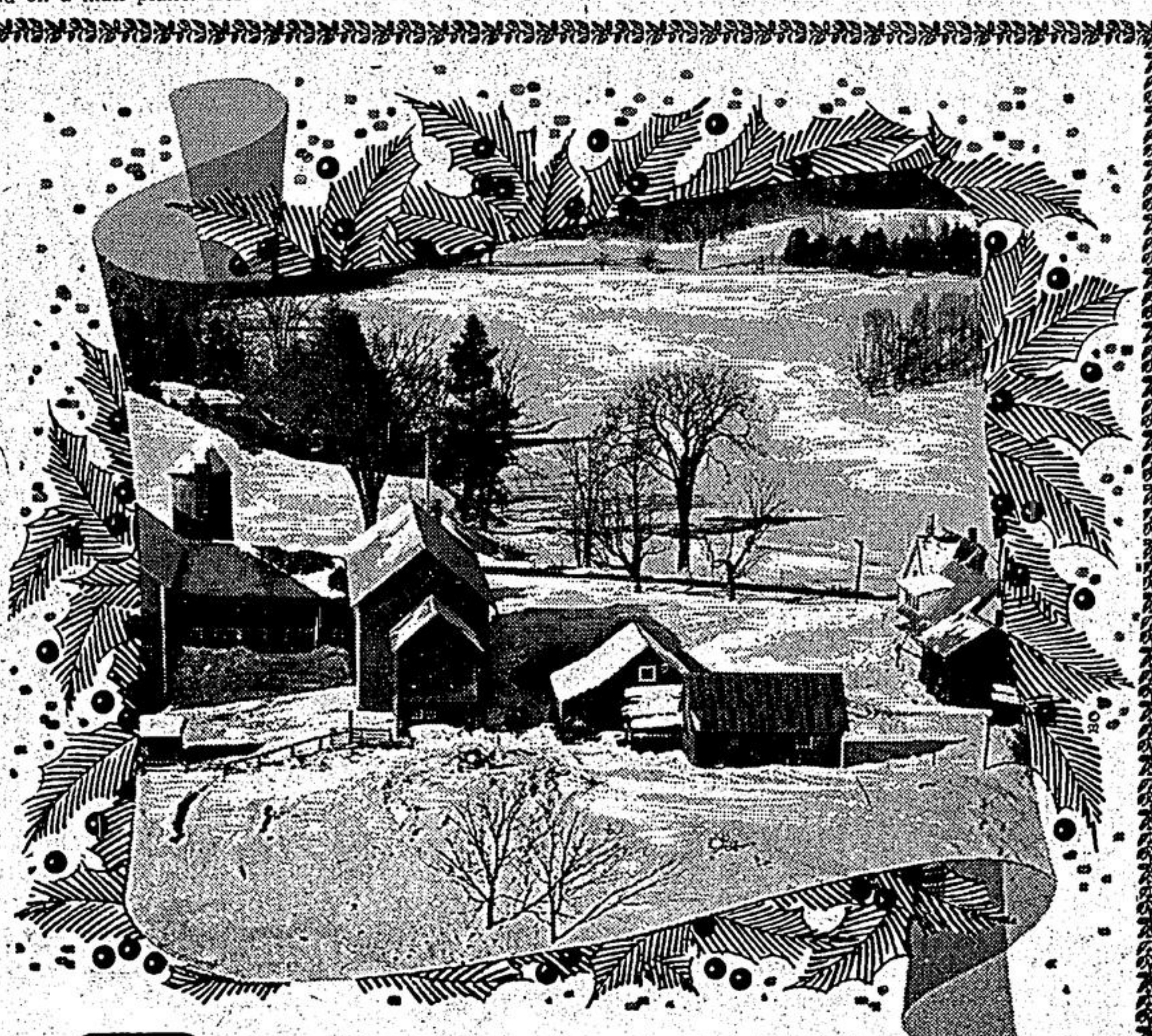
