## **Approve DDT** substitute

The recent ban on DDT should not cause field crop growers much of a problem in Ontario, except possibly where the control of cutworm in corn is concerned.

So says Professor Harold Goble, Department of Zoology, University of Guelph, who notes that even for cutworm DDT was not recommended here in 1969.

Among the replacements for DDT are a group of insecticides known as the organophosphates. This group contains some very, effective, yet very dangerous to handle, materials. Two that are still being widely used and are unaffected by the recent ban are parathion and Phosdrin.

Methoxychlor, endosulfan (Thiodan) and carbaryl (Sevin) will also be more widely used. These last three are relatively safe to use as far as the operator is concerned, and none should pollute the atmosphere if properly

Professor Goble points out that growers should be as well informed as possible on the hazards of using organophosphates. Rubber gloves, respirators, and protective clothing are required before some applications can be made. Growers should be sure to enquire about the need for such protective clothing when they purchase hazardous chemi-

Included was a petition from the ladies of Lemonville, praying to council that no licence for the sale of intoxicating beverages, liquor, beer or ale, be granted to any tavern or shop keeper, or operator of a public house of entertainment, within two miles of Lemonville. This was followed by a petition from the men of Lemonville to the same

Then came a by-law to prohibit the riding horses faster than a walk


over the bridges of the township, and another to levy a fine of 5 pounds on any landowner failing to cut the Canadian Thistles on his property. And finally, on inquiry, the clerk admited that the longawaited plan for zoning the township had not ar-
