It was only a very few years ago that the first snowmobile appeared in and around Stouffville.

Last season, the motor vehicle licence office in Stouffville sold over 500 two-year permits. An additional 300 or more have been sold this

Snowmobiling has become a great sport both for individuals and for families. It it not uncommon to see a car hauling a trailer with two machines and assorted sleds and toboggans aboard.

The business is booming, with dealerships and service centres specializing in snowmobiles springing up everywhere.

A few, though, have branded snowmobilers with a bad name. These few show a lack of consideration for others - both snowmobilers, and the population in general.

Tearing down farm fences, and tearing up peoples' lawns are problems that are not appreciated.

Already, notices reading 'no snowmobiles' are joining 'no hunting' signs along township sideroads. The reason for their appearance can be attributed only to the carelessness of a few. There are many areas near Stouffville ideal

for snowmobiling. County forests have trails marked for the purpose. Unused township road allowances make ideal 'stomping grounds', for the adventurous.

One thing that would be a boon to the Stouffville community is the formation of snowmobile clubs. Members could assemble and run over a predetermined route, or explore open areas together.

There is a great deal of discussion about control. But, the greatest control can be exerted by the owners of these machines, themselves.

Athletic grants exceed \$200,000

QUEEN'S PARK -Grants totalling \$201,475 to Ontario's 47 sports governing bodies have been announced by Minister of Education, William G. Da-VIS. hat of pince were to

The grants, under the Federal-Provincial Agreement on Fitness and Amateur Sport are for the 1969-70 program. Last year Ontario's sport bodies received a total of \$157,551 under the program.

Under the terms of the agreement each of the 47 governing bodies may apply to the Department of Education-for-financial support for a wide range of programs including leadership training courses, competition and developmental planning. In Ontario the program

is administered by the Department's youth and recreation branch. The program was started in 1961 to increase participation in amateur sport and to develop a higher level of competition. The following is a break-
