To re-set the clock is no easy chore, points out Mr. Kerr. To reach the mechanism, a huge filing cabinet must be moved, requiring the services of half the office staff.

And Clerk Kerr has every reason to wonder if the service is worth all the effort. When Tribune reporter Peter Harris checked the clock's timing, Thursday, it was 65 minutes
