Crop improvement meeting

YORK CTY. — It's not quite the right kind of weather to be getting all excited about growing this year's barley, corn and hay, but the men from the York Crop Improvement Association seem to think so. (I'd take snowmobiling myself, right now).

The crop men are having their biggest "do" of the year this week. It's the annual meeting, it's at Victoria Square, and it's Thursday, Jan. 15.

They will be pooling their ideas on things like soybeans, barley, chemical weed control, seeding Trefoil on sod, new spring wheats, fertilizers, and new kinds of alfalfa.

The experts will be there too. Jack Hagarty, Crops Specialist from our department, will have up-to-date information from

research on soybeans, corn and alfalfa.

The main speaker will be one of Markham Township's own farm graduates. Dr. Murray Miller, head of the Soil Science Dept., University of Guelph, and who broke into agriculture milking cows and hoeing turnips on the 7th of Markham, will relate many aspects of soil science to growing crops in York County.

Extra features will be the presentation of the corn championship to Murray Cupples of Mount Albert, world barley honors to Alex and Bruce Davidson, and the Moff Cockburn trophy to this

year's winner, Ken Stevenson of Udora.

The meeting starts right on the dot at 10.30 with lunch served at noon. Charlie Grubbe, the president, and Bob Benyon, the vice, along with the directors, have arranged a program that is well worth attending.

Passes for the Toronto Crop Convention and Machinery Show at the end of this month, will be distributed at the meeting.

Other dates to reserve are Jan. 20, Farm Safety Annual; Jan. 21, Beef Improvement Annual; Jan. 22, York Milk Committee, and Jan. 24, York Junior Farmers' Annual.

York Holstein

Gold ribbon producer

YORK CTY. — A pure-bred Holstein cow in the herd of Lowe and Row-

tree Ltd., Woodbridge, has been awarded a Gold Ribbon production certificate by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada. In nine lactations on twice-a-day milking, Glenafon Nettie Bonheur produced 229,795 lbs. milk containing 7,680 lbs. fat, average test 3.34% butterfat.

In her latest lactation, as a twelve-year-old in 305 days on twice-a-day milking, Maud produced 24,537 lbs. milk containing 782 lbs. fat, average test 3.19% butterfat. This record has a Breed Class Average of 197% and 171% for fat. Maud is classified "Excellent" for body conformation and is a Four Star Brood Cow.

Canada farm show world's largest

Another season of farm machinery shows is almost upon us. While Canada's winters put an end to many farming activities, it gives the country's farmers time to think about and pick out the new machinery they need for the coming crop year.

Of the three major farm shows, the biggest is still the Canada Farm & Industrial Equipment Show to be held this year from Jan. 28 to 31 in Toronto's Exhibition Park. Farmers and farm equipment dealers are in for a treat because the show is oversold on space bookings and will be the biggest in its history.

The Toronto show has become the biggest indoor event, devoted exclusively to farm and industrial machinery, in the world. Now an annual event on the eastern farmer and dealer's calendar, the show has doubled its size more than 12 times in the last 10 years.

The 1970 show program is full of features to interest dealers and farmers. One of the big highlights will be the International Hall, founded three years ago. Exhibitor space is completely sold out in this section and boasts machinery from Britain, U.S.S.R., West Germany, Denmark, Sweden and Norway. The British exhibits are part of a big push by the country for increased exports and the exhibitors are being sponsored by the British Government.

The Manitoba Government is also bringing provincial short-liners to the show for the first time.

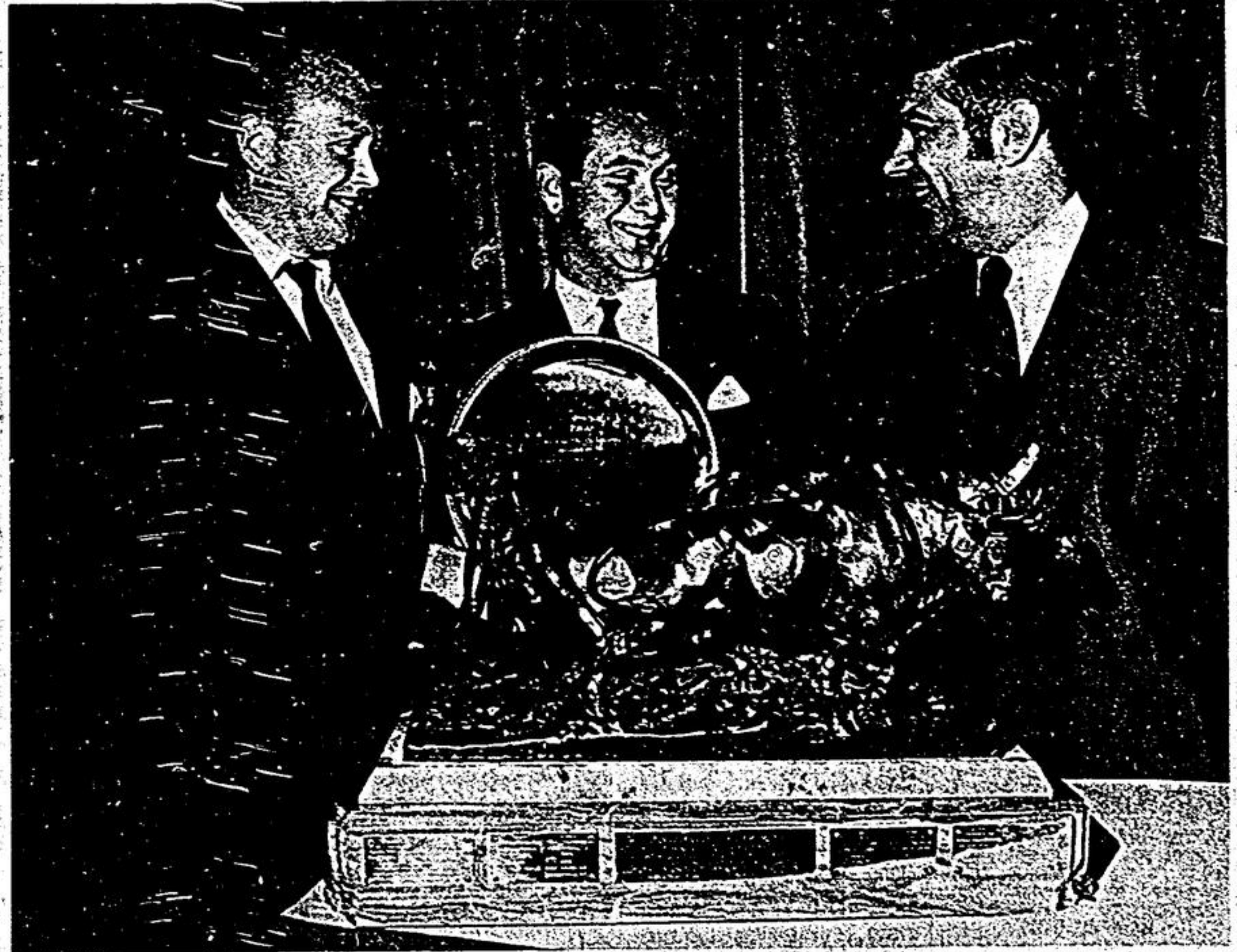
The special red carpet seen for the first time at the last show is being extended to join up the five main halls. A sixth hall — the upper cast annex — will again be filled by the Ontario Soil & Crop Improvement Association for its annual convention. The association will be using two meeting rooms, and each can hold 500 people.

In fact there will be two meetings going simultaneously leaving farmers with a choice of meeting.

The newest feature of the show will be in the west annex which was opened up in the 1969 show for lawn and garden & recreational equipment. The hall is now fully sold and the main highlight is a miniature nine-hole golf course being laid primarily to stimulate thoughts of summer and create interest in lawn and garden equipment, and which will be surrounded by lawn and garden exhibitors. This section should particularly appeal to people involved in golf course and municipal maintenance work and is another idea from show manager, Len Sykes.

Mr. Sykes stated: "Sales from our point of view have never been greater as early prior to the show, and never have advance exhibitor payments come in so early without reluctance, which seems to indicate they either have money or are getting it to save missing the show."

"The show is definitely a must of most Ontario farmers' calendars. Farmers do come here to buy. They get more attention at the stands, get a better price on equipment they buy, and after they've bought new equipment for the coming year, start making selections for the
