Girl awaits kidney transplant

By Evelyn Milsted GORMLEY — A number of folks in the Gormley community have been inquiring about my niece, Heather Christilaw, 19, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Christilaw (Ruth Gooding of Blind River) now living at Blind River.

Heather was the first kidney machine patient at Wellesley Hospital, Toronto, in the fall of 1966. She is only the third person to have both kidneys removed at the Wellesley. The other two lived only a few days following surgery. Although very weak, Heather was released last week and allowed to spend the weekend with her aunt. She is presently on the waiting list for a kidney transplant to be done at either the Toron-

to General or the Western Hospitals. Heather is very optimistic about the future and is looking forward to the day when she can resume her studies at the University of Toronto. The doctors claim her determination to live has been a main contributing factor in her progress so far. On Dec. 16, the day of Heather's operation, the United Church at Blind River remained open to allow people to enter and pray for her recovery. A special Mass was also conducted at the Catholic Church there. Her mother teaches in a public school at Blind River. Prior to her marriage, she taught for 2 years at S.S. No. 6, Victoria Square. Heather's father teaches in the High School at Blind River.

SNOW STORMS And BARGAINS

Winter is the toughest time of the year on car dealers. Not only is business at its lowest yearly ebb, but the dealer's cost of operation rises sharply.
