Stouffville Public Library

Circulate 40,000 books in 1969

STOUFFVILLE — The past year of 1969 was a successful one in the operation of the Stouffville Public Library.

Books circulated numbered 40,876. Of these 22,739 were Adults and 18,137, Children.

The total figure shows an increase of 3,661 over 1968. In addition, 186 magazines were circulated.

The number of subscribers is now approximately 2,300. There were 704 books purchased in 1969 and 106 books donated.

Total cash receipts amounted to \$696.74, accruing from the sale of cards and fines on overdue books.

No major acquisitions or repairs were made during the year. However, the hours of library service were extended, opening on Thursdays in addition to regular days and also remaining open in the summer, instead of closing down for a vacation period.

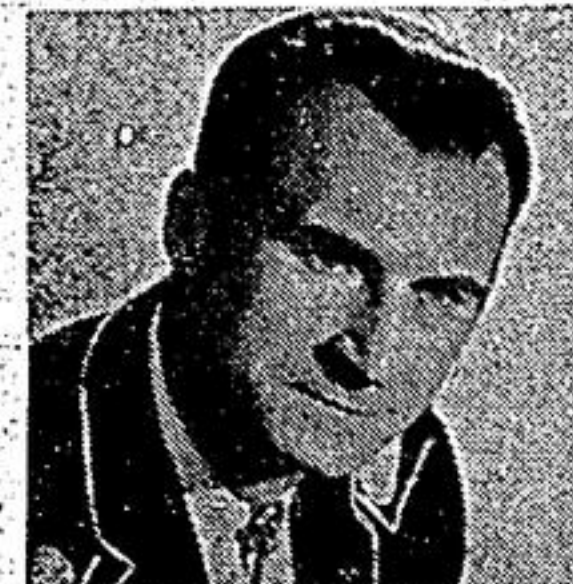
