Sky-Loft T-bar

Christened in shower of champagne

UXBRIDGE TWP. — With special guests and dignitaries on hand, Sky Loft Ski and Country Club in the Dagmar Hills officially opened a 1250-ft. T-Bar on Sunday.

The T-Bar represents a kind of iron monument to the desire and efforts of a group of skiers who just a year ago were trying to muster enough money to buy Sky Loft. The Club now has 150 debenture-holding members, has set a limit of 200 and boasts a waiting list of more than thirty. Each member owns a piece of the Club through a \$500. debenture.

The property consists of a two-storey lodge, on 106 acres, the T-Bar and a rope tow. The acreage covers a hill and the T-Bar goes to its peak. This means that Sky Loft offers a variety of trails, mostly wooded, and carrying such interesting names as Dublin Run, Rabbit Run, Melville, Marianna and Far North.

The hill has an interesting history. In the late 1930's skiers travelled by train from Toronto to Dagmar and then took horse-drawn sleighs to reach this highest point in Ontario County, almost 1450 feet above sea level. One of the first rope tows in the province was installed in these hills now just a 30 minute drive from Metro.

Howard Langille, a branny Nova Scotian who has since returned to his native province, built the log siding ski lodge in 1945 and operated the tows first for the Toronto Ski Club and later as a commercial venture. A few years ago he began renting the property to a group of skiers and then in 1968 he sold it to Mrs. Betty Madsen of Unionville. The skiers who were renting the property decided to try to buy it in January, 1969, and needed to sell 100 — \$500 memberships in order to raise the down payment. The 100 debentures were sold in two months and by summer 125 had been sold making a T-Bar for 1969-70 feasible.

The long term plan for Sky Loft is to make it a year-round country club with added facilities. However, skiing will always be paramount.

Club president is Glen Lowes, Markham, vice-president is Larry Burt, Port Perry and secretary, Eric Cook, R.R. 4, Uxbridge.

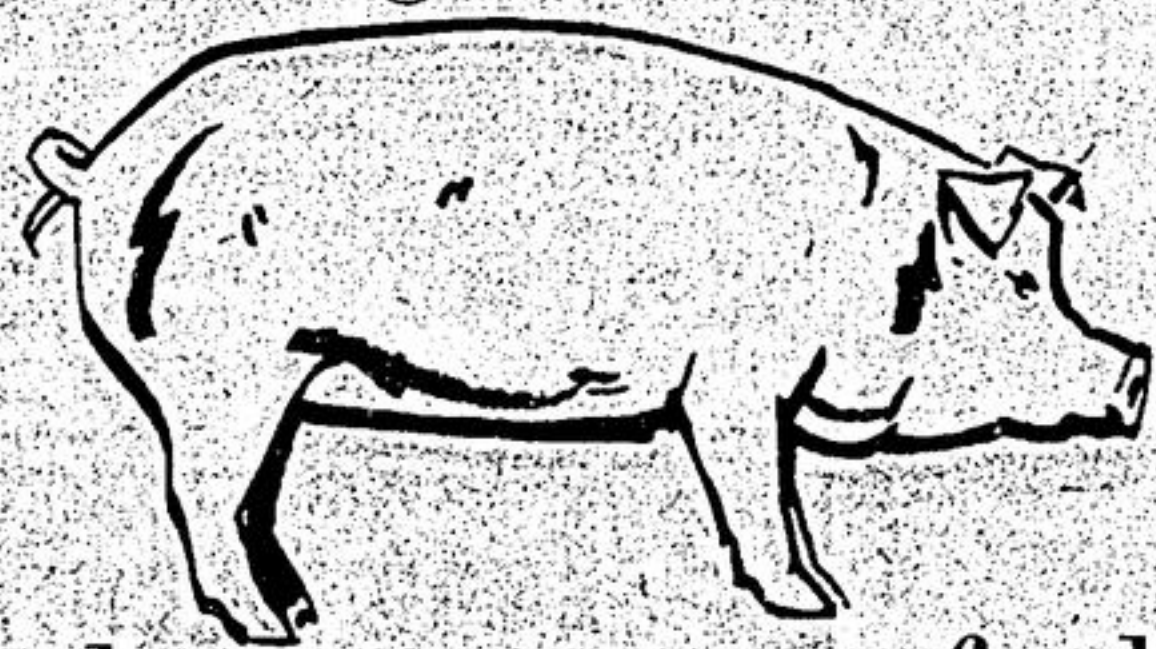
