## Students head north

STOUFFVILLE — Twenty-six Grade 13 students of Stouffville Dist. Secondary School will leave March 12 on an educational expedition into Canada's northland. They hope to gain some insight into the sub-arctic conditions and life in the Hudson's Bay region. They will spend a week in and around the old fur trading post at Moose Factory. The trip is co-ordinated with a classroom geographical study of Canada's great northern frontier. They will return, March 18.

The expedition will entail an expense of about \$2,000, almost all of which will be borne by the students themselves. Raising the funds has become a major class project.

Mr. Frank Wills, owner of the Ringwood Gas Bar, will turn his pumps over to the students, Feb. 28. The class is also operating a coat checkroom at school dances. The remainder, about \$70 per student, will be scraped from the bottom of their piggy banks.
