Heads Veterinary Association

UXBRIDGE—Donald G. Davis, D.V.M., of Guelph was elected President during the 96th annual meeting of the Ontario Veterinary Association held in Ottawa. He succeeds Dr. C.R. Buck of Waterloo in the leadership of the 1,100 member professional association of Ontario Veterinarians with headquarters in Guelph.

The new president is Regional Supervisor, Meat Inspection Division, Veterinary Services Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, a post he has held since 1966. As a successful general practitioner, he served the rural community around Uxbridge for 18 years following graduation from the Ontario Veterinary College in

1948. Dr. Davis was also active in community affairs. Following service on

the Uxbridge Hospital Board, and as a chairman of the Arena Commission, he took an active part in the town council and served a two-year term as Mayor.

Since moving to Guelph with his wife, the former Irene Mortimer of Elora, and 5 children, he has maintained an interest in minor hockey and been active in professional affairs. He was appointed to the O.V.A. Council in 1967 and has served on the executive, continuing education, and membership committees. He is the first non-academic to serve on the D.V.M. program committee of the University of Guelph.

Dr. Davis was born in Hensall and received his early education in Toronto.

Disposal site — an insult

WHITCHURCH TWP.—Councillor Merlin Baker has called the waste disposal site on Hwy. 48, north of Stouffville "the greatest insult ever perpetrated against the Township of Whitchurch."

"It was on this anti-pollution plank that councillor Baker headed the election poll last December and he has persisted in keeping the matter a contentious issue ever since."

Mr. Baker fears that the continuous dumping of liquid industrial waste from Metro at that site daily, will contaminate the water supplies on private properties as well as the artesian springs that service the Village of Stouffville.

At a recent meeting, he asked why a previous council had signed an agreement with the R.W. Bremer Company to allow the premises to be used for such a purpose. "In my opinion that agreement is one of the most iniquitous things ever signed. It means waste could be brought here from the United States if they want," he charged.

At the insistence of councillors Betty van Nostrand, Gordon Ratcliff and Merlin Baker, portions of the agreement were read by the Clerk, Thos. Kerr.

Deputy-reeve Norman Barnard took exception to

Mr. Baker's remarks, claiming he was implying that the previous council was stupid. "You're trying to make us look like fools and we're not," he said.

"I didn't say that — you did," countered Mr. Baker.

Judge Pearse agreed to adjourn the trial date to Feb. 20.

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

Agriculture in need of stability

YORK CTY.—The feed grain story is a big item now, for every livestock producer in York. With prices at distress levels in the West, it's easy to see that huge quantities of pork, beef, poultry and eggs may be coming to our market.

We have reports of barley selling in the West for thirty-five cents a bushel. This same barley sells here for around \$1.30.

The big difference is that grain can be sold within a province in the West, at any price at all. To sell out of the province however, all grain has to go through the marketing agency which sets a realistic price. The agency is the Canadian Wheat Board.

The result is that a hog producer at Mount Albert is in the same game as one at Swift Current but the rules are vastly different.

There are some easy answers but they don't solve much. The most obvious one is to scrap the Wheat Board, and let price find its own level. The immediate result would be ruin for our own grain growers, even lower incomes for the West, and stiffer competition for a beef producer at Stouffville.

Some mechanism to block the stupid local prices out West would be more to the point. What agriculture needs is stability. What we don't need is the price of grain jumping all over the place every time it rains or freezes. Large, well-financed companies can operate with prices of both inputs and outputs swinging constantly, but it is a different story for a guy who is the sole owner and financier of a farm.

Price supports, floor prices and quotas have lots of problems, but they might do more good than harm in the grain situation.
