MARKHAM - Every members of the Markham Town police department tread on uncertain ground - not onlywhile on the beat, but in the office as well.

A recent check by town building inspector, Bill France reveals that while the foundations and exterior walls are secure, the interior wooden beams and joists have deteriorated considerably due to dry rot. The floor of the building sags and plaster is falling off the walls.

Mr. France said temporary support was needed immediately, but the cost of a permanent repair was too high to be practical. The main floor beam, he added, was badly split and could be inoved by hand.

According to town historian John Lunau, the building was erected prior to 1840. In that year, it was used as a watch repair shop by one of the areas' early settlers, John Armstrong.

Reeve breaks deadlock

Approve pedestrian crosswalk

STOUFFVILLE - A pedestrian crosswalk, properly signed and illuminated, has been approved by council for the Main Street of Stouffville. The selected location is the intersection of Civic Avenue in front of the Imperial Bank of Commerce. The present 'courtesy walk' at Main and Market Streets will be abandoned.

The issue, subject of much debate, was finalized. March 5. Reeve Ken Laushway was called on to break a deadlocked recorded vote in favor of the project. The resolution, introduced by councillor Tom Lonergan and deputy-reeve Jim McKellar was opposed by councillors Mrs. Ethel Mole and Ian Chapman. Each put forward definite reasons for his stand.

Councillor Lonergan said the success of the venture would depend on the public's acceptance of it. He said its benefit could be impressed on the children through the schools. "I agree, There will be jaywalkers, but they do so at their own risk," he warned. He noted that if the location proved totally

unsatisfactory, it would be moved. "We've bantered this about for too long," agreed deputy-reeve McKellar, "the time has come to act". He said that with many Metro oriented people now in town, the legal 'walk' was an accepted thing.

Councillor Mrs. Mole said she was not convinced that Civic Avenue and Main was the proper place. "I'm afraid it will not provide us with the measure of protection we think it will".

Councillor Chapman said he was not convinced that people would walk from the Post Office up to Civic Avenue, if they wished to shop at a store west of Mill Street. He argued that a legal 'walk' tended to give many persons a false sense of security.

Reeve Laushway, in breaking the tie, admitted he had always favored the 'courtesy walk' system now in force. "There's never been an accident. I hope the same good luck remains, but basically, I'm afraid of it".

Promote estate homes

WHITCHURCH TWP. — A proposed zoning bylaw, now being prepared for the Twp. of Whitchurch by County Planner Conrad Dowson, will eliminate present restrictions, that prohibit building on 10 to 25 acre lots.

The proposal will free a large number of undersized parcels, registered on or before the date of the previous restrictive bylaw. One singlefamily house will be permitted on each lot having a minimum frontage of 75 feet and a minimum area of 15,000 square feet.

Mr. Dowson outlined his recommendations at a meeting of Planning Board, March 9.

Zones would include rural hamlet-type residential; estate residential, commercial, industrial and open space. Existing uses would be zoned accordingly, with much of the municipality remaining rural. New non-rural uses would require a zoning change. In this way, Mr. Dowson said, the township could control its own destiny.

Both board chairman Michael Cassidy and deputy-reeve Norman Barnard spoke in favor of zoning to accommodate estate-type homes. Requirements in such areas would include a minimum frontage of 200 fect, minimum floor areas, of 1,800 square feet and lots of not less than 2,

Board members will tour the township to learn what sections are best suited to this kind of build-up.
