AUTO SAFETY and THE FUTURE



Long after the hubbub about safety has ceased to be a political issue, the car makers are continuing to do what they have all along — search for new PRACTICAL ways to make cars safer.

One promising device is an air bag that will inflate upon severe impact and protect the car's occupants from collision.

The device is tentatively scheduled to be optional equipment on some 1971 models and standard on some 1972 models. It is now undergoing further study by the National Highways Safety Bureau of the U.S. Government.

The bags are designed to inflate instantly following a significant impact such as would occur in a collision. The bag would become a buffer between the car's passengers and the windshield, pinning the passengers back against their seats until it deflates moments later.

Head injuries and whip-lash would be prevented as the occupant is held firm against the back of the seat. Seat belts which most drivers still refuse to make use of, would become unnecessary.

While you're waiting for the safety bags, however, you will greatly increase your chances of surviving a collision by remembering to buckle up your old-fashioned seat belt.

LOANS...

How does a credit union provide credit?

By loaning money to its members, for provident or productive purposes.

What is meant by a "provident or productive purpose"?

Any purpose that will benefit the borrower. Is there any restriction on loans to members?

The credit union sets the maximum amount which may be loaned to a member with or without security, within the limitations of the Credit Unions By-Laws.

Who approves loan applications?

The Credit Committee, who carefully check the applicant outlining the purpose of the loan, the security offered, and the terms of repayment. The Credit Unions Act provides for approval of small loans, and for loans up to the value of a member's savings, by the treasurer, or manager, subject to certain conditions. The act now also provides for the hiring of a loan officer to lighten the burden of the credit committee in larger credit unions.

What is considered security for a loan?

Shares, wage assignments, assignments of monies receivable, co-signers, chattel mortgages, are accepted as security.
