MARSHAM - Tenders will be opened April 13 for an addition to William Armstrong Public School in the Town of Markham. Board estimate of the building is \$378,340.

Approval of the working drawings has been received from the Ontario Department of Education but a condition of the approval was that the cost should not exceed \$343,089.

This is a reflection of the depletion of the Ontario Education Capital Aid fund and the Department of Education's brake on new school construction.
