Charged with cruelty

UXBRIDGE TWP. — An Uxbridge Township man, charged by the Ontario Humane Society with cruelty to animals, has been fined \$50 and costs in Whitby Provincial Court. Allan Davis, Uxbridge, R.R.2 entered a plea of guilty when he appeared before Judge H.W. Jermyn, March 24. An Inspector told of visiting the Davis farm, Oct. 30, and finding a part-Labrador dog in a dehydrated condition, tied to a wrecked car. He said the animal was immediately removed from the property and taken to a clinic for observation and treatment. It was found to be suffering from anemia, malnutrition, dehydration, tapeworm and emaciation. In handing down the sentence, Judge Jermyn said the accused should not
