On March 31, 1920, Clare Balsdon and Marie Hamilton were married at the bride's parents' home, Spring Dale Farm, near Brougham.

On April 2, 1970, Mr. and Mrs. Balsdon were once again the centre of attraction. This time, the occasion was their Golden Wedding Anniversary. And it will remain every bit as memorable to both of them as the event of fifty years ago.

Clare was handsome and his wife lovely as they shook hands and chatted with a steady stream of old friends, neighbors and relatives throughout the afternoon and evening. The 'at home' gathering was held at the residence of a son, Vernon, George Street, Pickering Village. Other members of the family were present including two other sons, Keith of Sunderland, Kenneth of Pickering and their seven grandchildren, Murray and Dougie; Gregory and Bruce and David, Danny and Allan.
