

- Parents should note that—
- (a) Kindergarten pupils must have reached their 5th birthday on or before December 31st, 1970; (Proof of age is required for registration.)
 - (b) Parents must have declared themselves to be public school supporters in the County of York and be so listed on the tax rolls of the municipality in which they reside;
 - (c) Immunization records and health information on each new pupil are requested at registration;
 - (d) Younger children, whose 5th Birthday falls in the period January 1 - September 30 inclusive, may, under certain conditions, be enrolled in a Kindergarten; Special information for under-age registration may be obtained through the Principal.

It's the family who pay

ONTARIO RIDING — Perhaps it is time I paid a tribute to my long-suffering wife who has had to put up with having an MP for a husband. I must say she has been quite good about it, but being human she naturally complains once in awhile. It certainly is difficult for her and the children when I am away 5 days a week and on Saturdays and Sundays spend a large part of my time with constituents in the Riding.

This has been particularly true lately because of the series of Tax Meetings I have been holding in my home every third Saturday and other special ad hoc meetings which have been held in my home almost every Saturday.

I sometimes think it is the wife and children who pay the highest price because after all, when I am in Ottawa I am so busy and deeply engrossed in my work that there is hardly time to worry about being away from home.

The children are the hardest hit of all because they really fail to understand why it is necessary for me to be away all the time. To illustrate how they feel, I recall my daughter Juliana, who was 7 years old at the time, asking me a question. She said, "Daddy, do you know what I pray for all the time?" and I said, "no Julie, what is it?" Her reply was "that the week-ends will last 4 days so you can spend more time with us".

Situations like this make you wonder whether anything is worth that kind of price.

I can't complain because I was free to decide whether to run and seek this office or not. I made this decision and I do not really regret it, primarily because I feel that there is

an opportunity to do something very worthwhile here in Ottawa. I object to those who say that as a backbencher they have very little input into Government policy. I am not saying that they have a big input, but if they do not, that is their individual problem. In my own case, I feel that I have something to contribute and I have yet to experience the feeling that I am wasting my time.

I think if I were a Member of Parliament under any previous administration I might well be frustrated, but under the present system our participation is only limited by the amount of effort we put forward.

Combat drug problems

ONTARIO SOUTH Prime Minister Robarts has taken a firm stand against drugs, saying the Government is opposed to the legalization of marijuana and will take crash action to combat teenage drug abuse in Ontario.

The Prime Minister made his pledge at a dinner in Toronto in honor of Health Minister Thomas Wells, under whose jurisdiction the Addiction Research Foundation falls.

Mr. Robarts said the Government is presently preparing a program to deal with drugs. (In the Legislature the following day he elaborated on his remarks, saying one possible step is the consolidation of the work done by the various Departments in connection with drug use.)

Mr. Wells told the dinner guests that provincial action on drug use will probably follow publication of the report of the Federal LeDain Commission on Drugs.

Mr. Robarts also noted that the co-operation of local governments, school boards and parents will be needed to stop drug abuse. "I have teenaged children and I am sometimes shocked by what I can learn from them about the extent of the use of drugs," he said.

"I said, 'yes', and he said 'I hear you're going to legalize marijuana and when you do, we're all coming up there'. There was no smile on his face when he said it."

Education share over \$2,700,000

PICKERING TWP. Pickering Township's share of the Ontario County Board of Education's \$35,717,000 budget will be \$2,747,300, it was announced, April 2.

But, the sum does not represent an increase for the individual ratepayer. The mill rate for residential properties has gone down from 10.51 mills in school section 4 west, 11.29 mills in area 1 and 14.83 mills in area 2 to 8.53, 7.45, and 12.90 mills respectively. A two mill

decrease represents a cut of about \$60.00 on a property assessed at \$30,000.

The county budget shows an increase of over 18 percent compared for the year 1969. Sixty percent of the funds will be for teachers' salaries; ten percent for interest on board debt.

Poster project

ONTARIO CTY. — The Ontario County Farm Safety Council is again sponsoring a Farm and Home Safety Poster Competition. This is the tenth year for this project, and it has been highly successful. Last year 440 boys and girls from 20 rural schools in Ontario County took part. Prize money paid out amounted to about \$200.00.

Prizes will be awarded on a Township basis, and the competition is open to grades 5 to 8 in all rural schools in the County. Posters must not be copies of existing safety posters, and must be made on standard art class paper, and should not be larger than 14" by 20".
