Twp. of Markham

Propose new pool project

MARKHAM TWP. — A citizens' committee, in a recommendation to the Markham Twp. Parks and Recreation Commission, has pointed to the need of a public swimming pool within the municipality, with the suggested site serving as an addition to the Thornlea Secondary School, Bayview Avenue.

The total cost, including change rooms, is estimated at \$280,000.

Two pools at lesser cost were also considered but considered impractical for future requirements.

According to surveys, the committee said, pool useage in Markham Township would include approximately 11,000 swimmers per week. Cutting this figure by 50 percent, would still mean 800 persons per day, based on current population totals.

The report, contained in a 12-page brief, supports the Thornlea site since an addition to the building there is already planned. This would remove the additional cost of land and services that would otherwise be required.

The pool, as recommended, would measure 75' by 45' and accommodate up to 212 swimmers. The enclosure would measure 120' by 85'.

According to a schedule of rates as established by the committee, income on an annual basis would amount to \$48,000.

The Stouffville Public Utilities Commission has in the past maintained three major rate schedules; commercial, industrial and residential with small commercial customers billed at residential rates. With the implementation of this rate adjustment, commercial and industrial customers will be billed under a new rate structure called the General Rate.

The general rate is an important step forward in rate structure development. It is equitable yet simple, eliminating the cost differential in bills to commercial and industrial customers with identical load characteristics.

In addition small commercial customers will no longer be billed at residential rates, but at a special small commercial rate. The rate changes for commercial, industrial and small commercial customers are shown opposite at right.

Please note that in order to simplify billing procedures, the above rates are NET RATES. It will, however, be necessary to add 5 per cent for delayed payments.

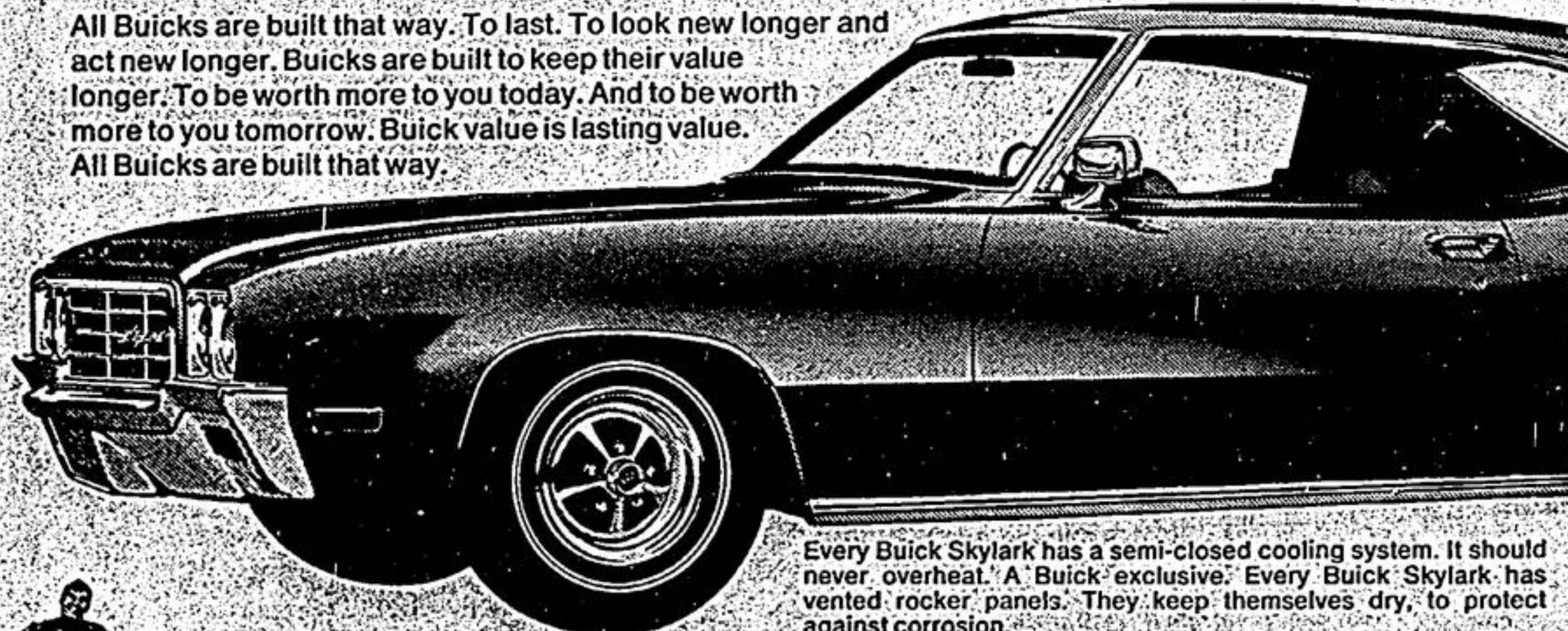
