From the minister's study

"WANTED: Fools for Christ's sake. Salary is based on the amount available in the treasury. Conditions are excellent, since you will be working together with God. The union is worldwide, and has Christ as its leader; therefore, strikes are not permitted. For further information contact your nearest Bible, and ask for first Corinthians one."

I have looked through that advertisement many a time to see if it could be improved somewhere. It was first published in the Jerusalem Times one thousand nine hundred and seventy years ago, and it has been running on every major news media ever since. Today the response is less than it was at the beginning.

The most obvious flaw that I can detect is in that first part about fools. If we could give preachers, pastors and missionaries some better title, perhaps the response would be better. — Wait a minute, what am I thinking about? They already have titles, big ones, too. You know what I mean, "Master of Theology", Doctor of Divinity", and always "Reverend".

Come to think of it, that old advertisement has been changed already. I wonder is it possible that the change was a mistake! Let's take another look at it. "Fools wanted for Christ's sake. . . Are preachers fools? It depends, I suppose.

A lot depends on what they preach. The thing that makes a preacher a fool for Christ's sake is the cross. Read all about it in I cor. 1. It's the preaching of the cross that makes a man a fool — a fool, that is in the eyes of the world. But "the foolish thing of God is wiser than men, and the weak thing of God is stronger than men." That cross and its victim turned the world upside-down, because it was wrong-side-up and inside out before that. We are still living in the after-glow of that earth-shaking movement.

So the old ad has been changed! Big deal. What do we have now? Nothing! Sweet nothing! Huge churches that are as dead as Ezekiel's dry bones, that's the remains of the cross-denying theology. The wisdom of men is pathetically weak beside the 'foolishness' of God. The world needs now, more fools.

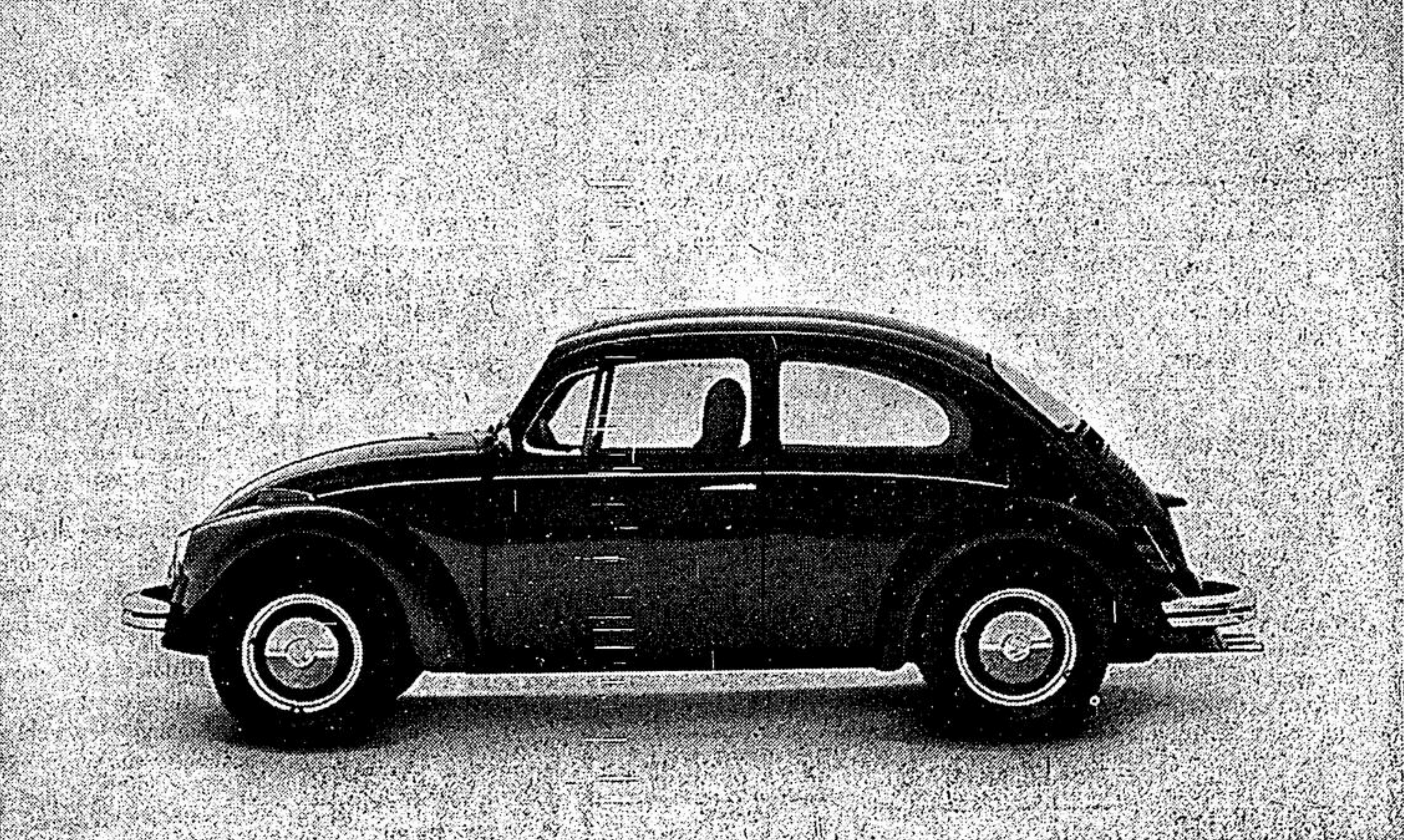
