Education costs hike tax rate

UXBRIDGE TWP Uxbridge Township taxpayers, registered as public school supporters in the township school area, with property assessed at \$3,000 will pay an additional \$36.75 in taxes this year.

Almost nine mills of the 12.25 mill increase over 1969 is attributed to public school costs. The rate for county purposes has increased approximately 2½ mills, while that for township purposes is up only about 1½. The amount allotted for secondary school purposes is down slightly, from 34 to 33.38 mills.

Parents with children attending the separate school in Uxbridge Town

will breathe a sigh of relief when they learn that, on a \$3,000 assessment, their taxes have decreased by \$39.78.

In that part of the township served by public schools in the Town of Uxbridge, an area that has been burdened with higher taxes than the balance of the township over the past few years, the increase is not as great - \$27.27 - for a total bill of \$323.97 in 1970, as compared to \$305.85 in other parts of the township.

Residents in the Goodwood streetlight area will pay an additional 2.1 mills, the same as last year. This figure represents about \$6.30 on a \$3,000 assessment.

To regulate gravel pits

UXBRIDGE TWP — In consultation with legal advisor, Mr. W.Z. Estey, Q.C., the council of the Township of Uxbridge is in the process of preparing a new bylaw to regulate the operation of gravel pits in the municipality.

A previous bylaw was quashed by the Supreme Court when contested by Miller Paving Ltd., a gravel firm with extensive holdings in the Township.

It is expected that the new bylaw will be given final reading May 14 in a meeting in the Municipal Offices.

Contained in it will be various clauses limiting the hours of operation, outlining the use of screening, and requiring that site plans be filed, that a bond be made to ensure the property be rehabilitated, and that the operators in the township be licensed.
