From the minister's study

Last weekend saw the opening of many cottages, and the initiation of "Spring Clean-up". Spring starts that proverbial fever that few are able to overcome. Some of the members in our family are coming down with it right now.

To put it plainly, the pressure is on from the female half of our household, to paint the kitchen, wash the windows and generally clean up. Eventually I will break, and give the walls the brush.

This urge that most of us have to cover the cracks and apply the gloss finish, reveals something characteristic of human beings generally. We tend to cover up.

In a sense I am glad we are built this way. If people lived carelessly, without the consciousness of others looking on, the pollution problem would be even worse than it is at present. We would be polluted with an ugly world.

You can see, then, that we humans have an inner courtroom set-up that passes judgment daily on this or that. That inner judge that we have is able to tell the difference between beauty and ugliness, good and bad, right and wrong. You probably know that humans represent the only form of life with this unique quality. Man (and there's no better explanation) is an image bearer of God.

In the event that you think a new subject is being introduced, let me clear the print.

The subject of God is intimately related to the story of "man and his world". Every generation gives evidence of man and his god; always man and his god. This generation of ours is no exception. The problem, as always, remains. Which one? Which god is right? Which one do I serve?

At this point, the God of the Bible has a word to say, an authoritative word. He has a very definite word for us about "Spring Clean-up", for example. Of course, the God of the Bible is not popular, because when He talks about clean-up, His idea is very different from ours. You know how we put on a very attractive front: how we squeeze putty into the cracks, and stuff the holes with filler, how we purchase a good hard finish that will withstand heat and cold — you know what I mean. We do it for our homes; we do it for ourselves.

Perhaps you are beginning to guess why the God of the Bible is not too popular these days. He penetrates beneath the toughest veneer to the foundation of life, sometimes called the heart. He starts there and works out. There's no cover up. "For the Lord seeth not as man seeth; for man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart." (I Samuel 16:7)
