



## Wet fields are delaying growth

The weather has been catchier and a little too slow, but seeding has gone fairly well this spring. The wet

fields are the only real problems, with rain coming just often enough to prevent them being

worked. Early growth of oats, barley, and hay is remarkably good. The warm spell two weeks ago got things started, and growth continues even through more backward weather of last week.

Many corn growers deliberately delayed planting, to get the best soil and early growing conditions. The risk of planting too early is overdone I think. It's true that there have been a few April failures, but just a few, and often the problem has been planting too deep, rather than too early. Still, from our research, May 10th to 20th is ideal for planting with our climate here in York.

Hay fields have wintered well, and alfalfa is off to a good start. It looks like hay very early in June for farms geared up to chopping the crop and using silo storage.

A final point on growing crops is that we have a new weather reporting service for farmers. It's by telephone and any farmer can get an up-to-date forecast by dialing 895-6117. It's set up mainly for vegetable growers but will be useful for any farmer.

## Farmers asked to withhold school tax

The Ontario Federation of Agriculture is asking farmers in the province to withhold education taxes in the coming year as a protest against inequitable tax rates.

The OFA sent a telegram to Roy Atkinson, president of the rival National Farmers' Union, asking for support in the campaign.

"Farmers pay almost four times in education tax what some people in higher income brackets are required to pay," OFA president Gordon Hill states. He said that the incomes of farmers would be less than a quarter of those in some professional groups.

"Education is not a service to land," Mr. Hill said. "The land doesn't produce children and it doesn't matter to the land if people are educated."

"Education is a service to people and people should pay for it. The money should come out of income and corporation taxes."

Mr. Hill said the farmers have been seeking redress from the Ontario Government since 1950. "We've tried quiet, reasonable

negotiating and it just doesn't work."

He said that farm representatives from across the province who will be meeting in Toronto on Thursday "seem pretty determined and I think they will withhold taxes this year."

The OFA emphasized that farmers must pay the portion of their taxes used for the support of township and county services. It claimed that the responsibility for the unfair taxation lay with the province and that local municipalities shouldn't be made to suffer.

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, that in accordance with the Weed Control Act, 1969, Ontario, Sections 3, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 15, unless weeds growing on their lands within the Township of Markham are cut or destroyed by

MONDAY, JUNE 1st, 1970

and throughout the season, the Weed Inspector of the Township of Markham may enter upon said lands, and have the weeds cut, charging the cost against the lands, as set out in the Act. The co-operation of all concerned is earnestly requested. Please note that dandelion and goldenrod are not considered to be noxious weeds under the terms of the Weed Act.
