From the minister's study

There must be some who read this weekly article who suffer pain and face death. On the other hand, all who read will eventually face that common, human enemy. This being so, a word to the weary is surely in order.

When someone asks, "How are you today?" the usual answer is, "Fine." Yet there comes a time when this one word requires serious modification. Sickness plagues us every day. People who know they are sick are afraid of the consequences, and those who are well are always afraid of being sick.

To summarize the problem of suffering would minimize the seriousness of it; to attempt a solution in such abbreviated form would be even more inadequate.

One thing I can do. As John Bunyan put it, I can speak as one in chains to those in chains.

How I wish I could write this one line and know it is the truth: "Have faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and He will heal your disease, and you will never die." But I cannot. In all honesty I cannot write that, for it is appointed unto man once to die. That means that both of us will face sickness that will lead to death. Even the doctor who provides medicine and prolongs life must resign himself to death as well.

For this very reason that I have stated, we must look to another. We must turn to someone who has the words of eternal life. There is only one that I know of: Jesus, the Son of God.

The most attractive quality about Jesus Christ is His willingness and ability to become human as we are, yet without sin. He did not give the world some flowery words of comfort from an ivory tower. Instead, He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross.

That is why Jesus is the only one who is qualified to sympathize completely with us, and then, because He is the eternal Son of God, He is able to provide eternal life for the sick and dying. But first they must suffer and die, for the servant is not above His master.

O soul are you weary and troubled? No light in the darkness you see?

There's light for a look at the Saviour,
And life more abundant and free.

Turn your eyes upon Jesus,
Look full in His wonderful face,
And the things of earth will grow strangely dim
In the light of His glory and grace.



Markham teacher to retire after 44 years



MARKHAM — The end of June will mark the end of an era for Miss Myrtle Hamill, staff teacher at Franklin Public School and a dedicated member of the teaching profession for 44 years.

She plans to retire at the conclusion of the current term and engage in such extra-curricular activities as gardening, photography and a trip to Expo '70 in Osaka, Japan.

"I want to do all the things I've never had time to do," she said, admitting honestly that making the 'break' from behind the class-room desk will not be easy.

As a young girl, Miss Hamill received her elementary education at Box Grove, later graduating from Markham High School and Toronto Normal School. Her first teaching position was in the junior room at Hagerman with a pupil enrollment of 48. She travelled by car from her home on Steeles Avenue when the weather was right, but boarded during the winter. Her only other schools have been in Markham, both Robinson and Franklin.

In the past four decades, Miss Hamill has quick to point out however, that the children have not changed as much as the system. Many of Miss Hamill's original pupils still reside in the area and she enjoys meeting and talking with them.

She will be afforded this opportunity, June 18, when a public reception has been arranged in her honor. This she has earned — and more.
