From the minister's study

On the David Frost Show last week, Lawrence Welk made a very interesting statement. He was giving some background to his very successful musical career. It seems he travelled across the country with his orchestra for 27 years. Then he made the statement:

"Today", he said, "we play to more people in our one hour show than we did in 27 years of travelling." Imagine that!

The mass communication that has become so much a part of our modern social set-up is almost too good to be true. It would be difficult to estimate the reaction if all radios and television sets were confiscated. Let's just say the populous would be caught in a shocking frenzy. We have come to depend very much on this modern means of communication.

Here's a question: What message do we receive from our sets? Apart from news that is for the most part reliable, the bulk of the programming is concerned with entertainment. There are a few interviews, plenty of movies, various varieties, and more than a sprinkling of commercials. The casual viewer or listener doesn't bother much about the message. He probably thinks there is no message. But there is, and it's a sad one. In short, it is a message of despair.

I know it is hard to believe that behind the antics of Lucy and the chuckles of Laugh-in lies a philosophy of hopelessness. The reason for the jokes is to dispel the fears. Reality and reason are not considered worthy of T.V. time. That is why Christian broadcasters have to buy time. No one wants to sponsor a message that comes to grips with reality.

People today, says the sponsor, want to escape from reason. They want to eat drink and be merry because they know that they are going to die. The masses want to drown their "soul-sorrow" in alcohol, drugs, entertainment and whatever other bogus happens to come their way. So, says the sponsor, if that's what they want, that's what they'll get.

To the Church of Jesus Christ still pure, I ask: Is your message worth anything to the world? Can it lift people out of their despair and help them face reality? Is Jesus Christ really the Son of the Most High God? Can he save people? If the answer is affirmative, please check your T.V. guide for prime time broadcasts sounding out your great message to a confused world.

Older residents will regret to learn of the passing of Sam Golden, resident of Stouffville back in First World War days. He later moved to the city but continued to come to town. Mr. Golden died Sunday morning after a lingering illness. He was 77. His wife Fanny survives him, also one son and three grandchildren.

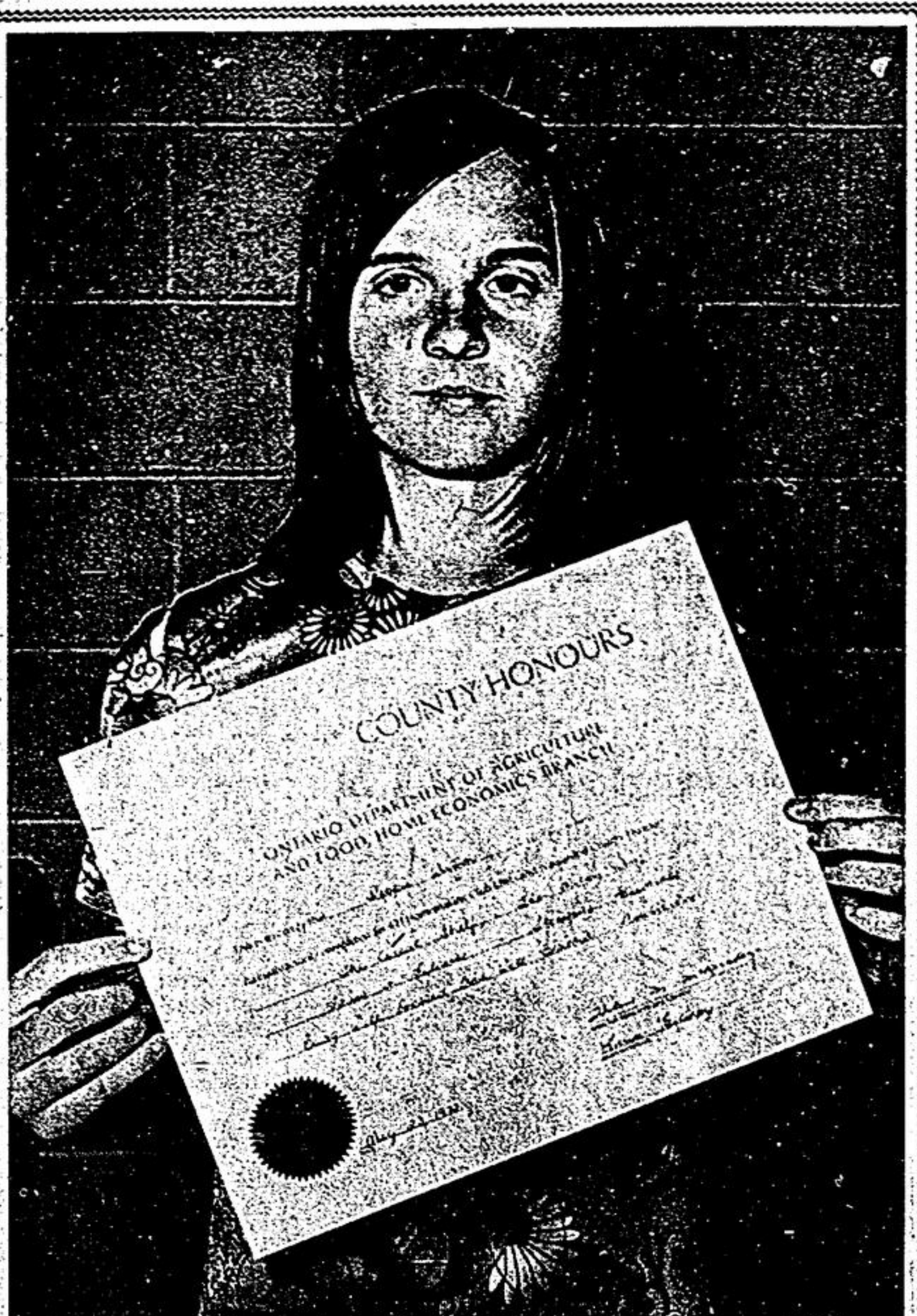
Wilma Korevaar, niece of the bride was the pretty flower girl. David Sedore, brother of the groom, was ring bearer.
