Stouffville — win or lose

STOUFFVILLE — It's still a bit early to make any rash predictions, but if Sunday's baseball opener at Sunderland is any sample, then I.G.A. shortstop, Rodger Todd is headed for one heck of a season.

The likeable infielder whacked out three successive hits as Stouffville downed their hosts 6-3 in nine innings.

The two rivals meet again here this Sunday. Game time is 2 o'clock.

It took Rodger a couple of trips to the plate to get his batting eye in focus and then 'Wham! Wham! Wham!' He belted a double in the 6th, a single in the 7th and another single in the ninth. Other hitters in the winners' circle were George McKay, Ted Suzuki, Dave Slack, Larry Spang and Nelson Wilson. Murray Holden and Glenn Jackson shared the pit-

chng chores. Ted Suzuki completed the battery. Sunderland actually led 2-0 at one point in the contest, pushing a pair of runners across in the fifth. Stouffville rallied with 4 in the sixth and two more in the seventh. That was enough. But, that's the way it was, May 28, as Stouffville defeated Stouffville — or was it the other way around — by the score of 6-5. The 'Bet. Pools' Intermediates played the Juniors, sponsored by Lee Sand and Gravel. The more experienced performers won out over youth and agility. George Neal scored twice for last year's finalists.

Victoria Square grabs share of first place

Stouffville's Intermediates staged a three-run rally in the eighth inning but it was too little too late as Victoria Square romped to a 10-5 victory in a South Ontario County Fastball League fixture, Monday.

The visitors were as consistent at the plate as they were in the field. Three Stouffville pitchers were clubbed for nine hits and Victoria Square committed only a pair of errors. By contrast, the Stouffville team managed only five hits and made seven miscues. Leaving eight men stranded on base added to the night of frustration for the locals.

Richard Burton hurled the first six innings and begrunded but two hits. A 9-1 cushion allowed coach, Reg Allen, the luxury of removing him in favor of Bruce Mortson. Mortson got into trouble in the eighth but recovered in the final frame to preserve the win. The losing pitcher was Bob Parish who left the mound for Bob Hopkins after being charged with five runs. Following a shaky sixth which added four more, Gord Tarr came in and pitched steadily, allowing one run on two hits.

Victoria Square had no shortage of lumbermen as Rick Elliot had a perfect night with three hits in three trips. One was a three bagger. Dave Harris contributed to the win with two for three. For Stouffville, Bob Parish had more success at the dish with two safeties in four chances, including a home run.

Larry Kelson for Victoria Square made three fine catches on hits labelled for extra bases.
