Public school track meet Saturday

Top athletes compete

Juveniles impressive despite loss

STOUFFVILLE - Ten elementary schools, including five from Ontario County, will participate in the third annual track and field meet on the grounds of S.D.S.S., Saturday.

The meet chairman is Mr. Gary Harrison, Webb School, Uxbridge Township. Other entries are: Fifth Line, Glasgow and Goodwood, all from Uxbridge; Claremont and five York schools - Orchard Park, St. Mark's, Summit View and Stouffville Junior High plus Ballantrae in Whitchurch.

Registration begins at 8.15 a.m. with competition to start at nine. The public is invited. Stouffville's Orchard Park School has won the event since its inception in 1967. Last year, not only did they have the highest total of points, but also received the largest collection of trophies.

Jennifer Smith won the Junior girls championship; Kim Hassard, Intermediate girls; Jenny Bangay, Sr. 'A' girls; Bob Bangay, Sr. 'A' boys and Frank Roberts, Sr. 'B' boys.

St. Mark's came in a strong second, with Mark Chamberlain and John McDermott tying for the Intermediate boys title. Carolyn O'Connor was the Sr. 'B' girls champ.

Kent Wideman was the only student from outside Stouffville to win a championship. He captured the Jr. boys title.
