From the minister's study

Under their breath, after watching the late newscast, most sensible people whisper the question, "Where will it end?" News these days is scary. Between strikes and wars and riots on the streets we have quite a nightcap. Once in a while we have a pleasant moon landing which is always helpful in breaking the grim monotony of the "News, weather and sports".

An obvious reality that the news reveals is the increasing complexity of our 1970 way of life, which can be either good or bad, depending on how it is handled. Yes indeed, where will it end? It must end somewhere; everyone knows that. The only comfort most of us have is that everything will hold together until we wind up our three score and ten on this crazy planet. After that, well, what difference does it make?

It makes a lot of difference. First of all, no one is really sure how much longer the world will continue in its progressive complexity. It could be 50 years or it could be 5,000. In any case, it will end, we know that now. The important point to remember is how it will end, and how to prepare for the end if it should come in this century. (Fall-out shelters were a farce.)

I fail to find a more satisfactory answer to the question of how the world will terminate than the one set forth in the Bible. The event that will culminate all others is the coming of Jesus Christ, the Creator and Redeemer.

"Ha, ha, ha, not that again. The second coming. Is that the best this guy can do?" Yes, that's the best I can do. Sounds ridiculous, I suppose, to someone who is not familiar with the facts.

The idea of the second, victorious coming of Jesus Christ has been heralded for a couple of thousand years now. It has become a joke to most people. A mechanic was having a difficult time removing the rusty brake drum of my Volkswagen, in which event he scoffingly said, "It's like the second coming." (Incidentally, the drum came off eventually.)

Peter, the apostle who lived very close to the Lord, wrote down what he knew. Here is part of it: "Scoffers will come on the scene with their scoffing...saying, 'What about His promised coming?...Do not overlook the fact, dear friends, that with the Lord one day is as a thousand years and a thousand years as one day. The Lord is not negligent about His promise as some think negligence; instead, He is exercising patience with you, unwilling that any should perish but that all should come to repentance...But in accord with His promise we are looking for new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness is at home.'" (11 Peter 3).

Where will it end? With Jesus Christ, the Beginning and the End.
