Poison algae pollutes pond

GOODWOOD - Like science-fiction movies? You know the kind - where suddenly, without warning, a slimy kind of organic substance emerges from the sea to victimize a guy and his girl, stretched out on the sand.

I do. And all the while I'm sitting there, watching this great glob of jelly-like substance do its dirty work, I ask myself - could such a thing ever occur in real life?

It can cause the most cynical T.V. viewer to shudder at the thought.

And I shuddered, Friday, as I stood at the edge of a farm pond, near Goodwood in Uxbridge Township. For there, in reality, was death itself, just as any Fright-Night producer might have visioned it.

The killer scum or algae covered the entire pond area, more highly concentrated in some sections than in others. It changed locations with the change of winds.

I was not alone in this self-appointed assignment. With me, also staring into the murky depths was a seasoned veterinarian and a senior college student, eager to seek out the source of the problem and discover a solution. Each of us offered opinions as to what had actually happened to make this harmless under-water vegetation suddenly run wild. All admittedly were guesses, some educated, some not.

The known toll up to that time was seven cattle dead and 42 others under


