

Speeding charge

Suspend license 30 days

MARKHAM — A Markham area man, now living at Musselman's Lake had his licence

suspended for 30 days and was fined \$50 following conviction registered on a speeding charge aired in Richmond Hill Court, June 12.

David MacAloney entered a plea of guilty to the charge.

P.C. William Thomas of the Markham Town Department told the court that he observed the accused east bound on Number 7 Highway at a high rate of speed.

He said that he took up pursuit and followed the accused at speeds of over 90 miles an hour. He was finally able to stop the car on Conc. 10 south of Stouffville.

He was charged with 40 miles an hour over the posted limit. The highway traffic act empowers a magistrate to impose a licence suspension up to a 30 day maximum when the conviction is for a rate of speed 30 miles an hour or more over the limit.


Committed for trial

P.C. Thomas Wauchop told the court that the police were called, and as a result of investigation, the Oliver youth was questioned and later made a signed statement admitting his involvement in the episode.

Interim tax bill

MARKHAM — Interim tax bills, amounting to 8 mills on this year's assessment, have been mailed to property owners in the Town of Markham.

The taxes will be due June 30 and there will be a 1 percent per month penalty for arrears.

Council decided, June 1, that some move must be made to collect a portion of the taxes to meet expenses for the period. Delay in the actual mill rate being set is accredited to the provincial government in that they have not advised the municipalities in the county on how taxes under the new assessment will be equalized in the different municipalities.

Bell rate request

STOUFFVILLE — An application by Bell Canada, if approved by the Canadian Transport Commission, would increase residential telephone rates in Stouffville from \$4.40 to \$4.70 per month, Manager Gordon S. Wansbrough said this week.

Hearings will begin Sept. 9 in Ottawa.

Rates for individual business service would rise from \$9.10 to \$9.65 per month, Mr. Wansbrough revealed.

Additional revenue is required, Mr. Wansbrough said, to offset rising costs and prevent deterioration in service.
