### Uxbridge student athlete

## Dies suddenly during ball practise

UXBRIDGE TWP. - While most young people were celebrating the end of the school year, there was no joy in the Roseville-Siloam communities of Uxbridge Township.

Quite the opposite. For instead of a holiday begun, it was a life ended.

Ronald Powell, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Powell, R.R.1, Uxbridge, died suddenly, June 23, the result of an apparent heart attack.

A good student and an excellent athlete, Ron had graduated to Grade 12 at Uxbridge Secondary School.

It was while standing at home plate during a softball practice at the Siloam Community Centre, that he complained of feeling ill. Seconds later, he slumped to the ground unconscious. Team Coach, Jake Demchuk and Douglas Sheridan provided external heart massage and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation in an effort to revive him, without success. He was taken by ambulance to Uxbridge

Cottage Hospital but pronounced dead on arrival. Born at Pembroke, the deceased moved to Roseville when his parents built a new home there seven years ago. He attended public schools in Roseville and Goodwood.

Ron was an all-round athlete, excelling in track and field, football, basketball and wrestling. He was also a member of the Great Pine Ridge General Radio Service Association.

Surviving, besides his mother and dad is one brother, Warren and two sisters, Sandra (Mrs. Ramon Woermke), Scarboro and Gail (Mrs. Edward Kenney), Wolfe Island, Kingston.

Rev. James A. Mills, Trinity United Church, Uxbridge, conducted the service, June 26, from the Low and Low Funeral Home with interment, Siloam Cemetery. The pall-bearers included student friends, Dallas Bewley, Garry Demchuk, Edward Beach and Brian Goodspeed, Danny Tomkins and Harold Brown.

STOUFFVILLE - Three Stouffville youths are in custody awaiting sentence, following their conviction, June 26, on a charge of robbery.

Ferdinand Kunig, Paul Ogar and Kenneth Tindall will appear in Toronto City Hall Court, July 3 for sentence.

The trio were apprehended by Stouffville police after a hitch-hiker complained that he had been robbed of six dollars.

William Hughes, 19, of Scarborough, told the court that a car containing four occupants, picked him up on Main Street. When they reached Ringwood, he testified, Kunig told him to empty his pockets. He complied, he said, and \$6 was removed from his wallet. After his money was taken, he testified, Kunig told Tindall, the driver, to pull over and let him out.

## Foot severed in mower drives half mile for aid

UXBRIDGE TWP. - An Uxbridge Township farmer drove his tractor half a mile to obtain help after his right foot was severed in a hay mower, June 24.

Harvey Carrol, Stouffville, R.R. 3, later explained how he was working with the implement when it jammed. He said he shifted the gear into neutral but neglected to disengage the power take-off. When he stepped from the machine, it suddenly rolled forward, cutting the foot off above the ankle.

Mr. Carroll, age 80, drove to the property of Mrs. Isobel Beach, conc. 2, in hope of acquiring assistance. There, he was aided by Harry Madden and Don Lehman, both of Stouffville, and an unidentified Bell Telephone lineman.

In an effort to get Mr. Carroll to Uxbridge Hospital as quickly as possible, Beverly Beach used his car rather than wait for an ambulance.

The victim remained fully conscious throughout the ordeal. The foot, held on by thin pieces of flesh, had to be amputated.

## Municipal Board considers complaints

CLAREMONT - Residents opposed to the erection of ammonia storage tanks at the Claremont Co-operative will have the opportunity to file their objections with the Ontario Municipal Board.

The green light for the project has been given by the Pickering Township Planning Department and the Township Committee of Adjustment but the final decision rests with the OMB.

Notice has been filed with property owners within 200 feet as well as residents who appeared at the Committee of Ad-

justment meeting voicing either approval or objection to the plan. These people have a period of 14 days in which to make their opinions known. If there is objection to the plan, an OMB hearing will be held to deal with the matter.

### Two dogs die in barn blaze

WHITCHURCH TWP. - Two dogs died Saturday evening, in a blaze that destroyed a barn on the property of Marcel West, Bethesda Sideroad, west of Hwy. 48 in Whitchurch Twp.

The fire was confined to the one building and 7,000 chicks in an adjacent steel structure suffered no harm.

## A family affair 1400 attend gathering

MARKHAM - When the Reesor family descendents hold a reunion, it's an affair to remember - for ten years.

That's how often the kin of Christian Reesor and Fanny Reiff get together. They gathered, 1,400 strong in the Markham Arena, Saturday, coming from as far distant as Jamaica, Newfoundland, British Columbia, Washington and North Carolina.

The scene was one of contrast - from dutch bonnets to sun hats, from ankle-length dresses to psychedelic slacks, all representing individual customs, yet mingling together for a common purpose.

There was Abram Rittenhouse of Cedar Grove at 97 and Mrs.

Nettie (Ramer) Wallace of Toronto at 90.

There was Leanne Michelle Reesor, 10 day old daughter of Ivan and Carol Reesor Markham and Corey Leigh Fairbairn, 5 week old daughter of Garfield and Marg Fairbairn, Newmarket.

Present were Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Reesor who attended the first reunion in 1901 and every one since. A similar record is held by Mrs. Eva Reesor. Also present in 1901 and again in 1970 were - Ira Reesor, Orillia; Colby Reesor, Medicine Hat, Alberta; Amelia (Reesor) Nighswander, Stouffville, R.R.3; Irene Reesor, Locust Hill and Margery Mertens, Stouffville.

The State of Pennsylvania was well represented through the

Risser cousins. Amos Risser, Elizabethtown, Penn., addressed the gathering on the delegation's behalf.

The group portrait was taken outside, the 'family' members completely filling the bleacher stands. A deep panoramic camera was used. The finished photo will measure 3 feet in width by 8 inches in depth.

The program was in charge of the reunion president, John F. Reesor of Hamilton. Rev. A. Phillip Silcox, formerly of Greenwood, was guest speaker.

A souvenir plate, portraying a sketch of Peter Reesor's early pioneer home, was over-sold and a re-order has been submitted. A revision of the Reesor family record book is planned. The last one was published in 1950.
