STOUFFVILLE — Stouffville fans will be treated to another baseball twin-bill Sunday when Cambray comes to town.

Last Sunday, the home squad hosted Sunderland and split the doubleheader. They dropped the opener 3-2 but came back to win the second 9-8.

Weatherwise, the afternoon was perfect, attracting a large contingent of spectators. Geoff Gaston took the loss on the Stouffville mound although he hurled well enough to win. However, his mates gave him little help at the plate, mustering only two hits in 7 innings.

John Hogg was the big gun for the visitors, blasting a ground rule double in the 5th with the sacks load.

Larry Spang with two, Jody Holder and Mike Cadieux were the safety slugs in a losing cause.

In the return tilt, Roger Todd came off the bench to hit and pitch his team to victory. While yielding 13 hits, he connected for three singles at the plate.

George McKay belted a homer as did Larry Spang, each with the sacks empty. McKay also collected two singles and Spang one. Geoff Gaston and Glenn Jackson poked out a pair apiece, all single safeties.

Trailing 9-6 moving into the top of the 9th, Sunderland narrowed the score on a single by Hogg and a 4-3 slugger by Pickett. Routine outs ended the rally.

Battle to draw

BROUGHAM — It was a tense ninth inning. Brougham and Claremont were tied 6-6 with bases loaded and two out. The stage was set as Brougham sent pinch hitter, Bob Schram, to the plate. Drama was denied the local fans as the re-enactment of 'Casey at the Bat' took place. Schram could not be faulted. It took a perfectly executed change-up by Grant Norton to assure the situation.

Claremont bounced into the lead 3-0 during the initial inning but, Brougham battled back in the second

to even the score. A big fifth frame put the homesters out in front by a comfortable 6-3 after blasting Murray McDowenn for four safeties. Claremont whittled away with one run in the sixth and two more in the seventh to re-establish the tie.

Brougham's John Annis pitched steady ball giving up five hits before being relieved by Roy Hooker in the seventh. Murray McDowenn started for the visitors and allowed eight hits before Grant Norton took over.

Once again, Claremont suffered in the error column. This time two miscues in the second inning provided Brougham with the support to score three runs. Brian Madill was the hero of the inning with a sharp blast to left field which resulted in a home run and sparked the three run rally. He responded again with a single to record two hits in three attempts. Team mate Joe Luciano matched his performance with two for three. For Claremont, Jim Hopkins singled twice in four tries.

Players receive gifts galore

STOUFFVILLE — It's difficult to re-activate hockey enthusiasm with the mercury nudging ninety.

It's hard to think about slap shots in the season of home runs.

But for one night — Friday night, Stouffville fans took time to honor one of the few, and perhaps the first O.M.H.A. team ever to bring an Ontario Title to town.

The guests, members and management of Stouffville's Juvenile 'B' champions, were honored as champions, a kind of part-payment for the honor they themselves had brought to the community back on March 29.

Team manager, Ray Steel officiated as master of ceremonies.

Beside him at the head table was the club coach, 'Jake' Harman, accorded a standing ovation by player personnel.

But to coach the team to a Provincial title was not enough. To show his appreciation for support and cooperation received, he presented each boy with an engraved trophy as a personal keepsake and reminder of the event. Other gifts included engraved gold wrist watches from the village, presented by Reeve Ken Laushway, leather jackets, cardigans and colored photographs.

Reeve Laushway complimented the team on its accomplishment. He said that even rival clubs, defeated along the way, had praise for their sportsmanship, both on and off the ice.

Visiting dignitaries included coach John McLellan and forward George Armstrong of the Toronto Maple Leafs; Vern McCallum and Gordon Hawes of the O.M.H.A.; M.P. John Roberts and M.P. Bill Hodgson. Paul Mathews of the Binsmen and Ivan Harris of the Lions spoke briefly.

Team captain, Jim Lamoreaux presented coach Harman with the puck that scored the winning goal in the fourth and final game at Aylmer, suitably engraved and mounted.

Two huge pennants, one for 1969 (finalists) and the other for 1970 (champions) were on display in the banquet hall. They will be erected in the arena as a constant challenge to other teams in the future.

Intermediates defeat rookies

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville fans had some difficulty deciding their allegiance as the Juveniles and the Intermediates faced each other in a South Ontario County Fastball fixture, Monday.

Regardless of choice, they were treated to a fine game which saw the veterans take a 9-5 decision over the league rookies.

After a wild seventh inning, the Juveniles were in contention with a 4-4 tie. Three consecutive errors by the Intermediates — one which resulted in

two runs — almost thrust the "kids" into the lead. The Intermediates settled down and put together five hits in the final two frames to give them five more runs and the victory.
