Please take note that the fourth instalment of the 1970 Realty Taxes is due and payable on or before August 4th, 1970. Allowing for the amount interimly billed, the remaining balance will become

DISCOUNTS FOR PROMPT PAYMENT

A discount of 1% will be allowed on the final bill if paid in full before August 4th, 1970.

PENALTIES FOR LATE PAYMENT.

If there is a default in payment of ony instalment by the due date named for payment thereof, the subsequent instalment or instalments shall be-

Penalties will be charged at the rate of 1% per calendar month or fraction theerof and will be added to each instalment of taxes commencing on the first day of default following the due date of each instalment.

School Tax Credit Assistance Act provides for a tax deferment if the home owner is sixty-five years of age or over. This Act enables the taxpayer to apply for a maximum deduction of \$150.00 per annum, or 50% of the total taxes.
